

## Keeping Them Clear, Safe and Clean Is a Responsibility We Share

ecatur residents invest millions of tax dollars on the installation and maintenance of sidewalks, but often pedestrians find themselves in situations where residential landscaping has grown over the sidewalk or slippery leaves and landscape debris make the passage unsafe.

Per city code, residents are responsible for the upkeep and de-littering of their property all the way to the curb. Prune all plants so they are behind the edge of the sidewalk and make sure there is at least seven feet of clearance above the sidewalk so that pedestrians are not impeded by bushes or low branches as they walk. 



## A PLACE WHERE EVERYONE IS WELCOME

#### Commissioner Kelly Walsh interviews YMCA Executive Director

City Commissioner Kelly Walsh serves on the Community Engagement Board of the Decatur DeKalb YMCA. Recently, she sat down with the YMCA's new executive director, Stacey Stevens, to learn more about her career journey and the goals she has for the organization.

#### Tell me a little bit about yourself. How long have you lived in Decatur and where? When did you join the YMCA and become its executive director?

My husband John and I have lived in Winnona Park since 2013, along with our two daughters, Madison and Sydney. Prior to moving to Decatur, we lived in Kirkwood for 17 years. I began my YMCA career in 2001, serving in various roles at the Decatur Family Y and YMCA of Metro Atlanta Association Office. I was named the executive director at the Decatur Family Y in November 2020.

#### What are a couple of your favorite things about working for a nonprofit like the YMCA?

What energizes me most about working for the Y is that we are a nonprofit organization uniquely positioned to meet unmet community needs. We are so much more than a "gym and swim." Each Y organically develops programs specific to each local community. With our proximity to Clarkston, the Decatur Y was able to create programs to meet specific needs of children from refugee and newcomer communities.

The Decatur Y Motel Program began in the summer of 2019 with the goal of providing daily food, summer day camp activities, and essential resources for children living in motels. As the pandemic emerged in the winter of 2020, the Y quickly pivoted to provide additional resources to families living in extended stay motels. Now, thanks to many partnerships, we are on a mission to provide critical needs for families with children living in hotels to build trust, improve educational outcomes, and break the cycle of poverty. People are our why - inclusion and equity are at the heart of everything we do.

#### What have been some of your biggest challenges in leading the Decatur Family YMCA through the pandemic?

Our priority is always to put the safety of our staff, members, and the community first. The pandemic presented many challenges that required constant vigilance to be sure we were making the best decisions possible for our team and audience. It's not always easy to please everyone in an environment where there are so many differing opinions, but as long as we lead with safety first, we know we are remaining true to our mission and focused on the health and wellness of our community.

#### What's different about the Y over the last few years and how it relates to the community at large?

While these past two years brought a lot of new challenges and uncertainty, it also presented the opportunity to serve our community in profound and selfless ways. At the outset of the pandemic, many childcare centers, afterschool programs, and schools closed their doors. Ys across Atlanta opened their doors to care for the children of frontline workers, including healthcare professionals, first responders, and grocery and warehouse employees. In the fall of 2020, when schools shifted to virtual learning, we developed Y Campus Connection to support children through online learning while their parents continued to work.

Despite extraordinary circumstances that have continued throughout the pandemic, we are strengthened by those who have championed our mission through tangible resources, committed partnerships, time volunteered, and words of encouragement.

What are some ways that the Decatur DeKalb YMCA and the City of Decatur partner to serve the local community? Are there things you'd like to see happening in the

#### future with regard to programming, outreach or anything else to meet the needs of the community?

The Decatur Family Y was built in 1960, and we've enjoyed a strong partnership with the City of Decatur. We've partnered with Decatur Parks and Recreation to provide youth sports programming, safety around water classes and previously, afterschool care for children attending City Schools of Decatur. We've also collaborated with Decatur Active Living to provide meals to adults and families in transition. Leading with equity at the heart of everything we do, we look forward to working with the City of Decatur to address health disparities across race and socio-economic conditions, lead with education, and provide connections to health services and resources.

#### Would you say there's a place for anyone and everyone at the Y?

Everyone has a home at the Y. In a world of divisions, the Y remains a place where everyone is welcome. It is a safe space, where children, teens and adults can receive the support they need to achieve their fullest potential. Our 62-year history of the Decatur Family YMCA is a testament to people doing remarkable things together. We want to create spaces and experiences that foster equity and inclusion, promote a deeper understanding of people of diverse faiths and backgrounds, and be an organization that is open and welcoming to all.

#### **Invasive Plants Highlight**

## Callery Pear Trees

eware the Trojan Horse that is the Callery pear tree! While often thought of as a beautiful harbinger of spring, these ornamental flowering trees are becoming as prevalent and problematic as kudzu and Chinese privet when growing in the wild.

Native to Korea and China, Callery pear trees were introduced in the United States in the early 1900s. In the 1960s, the Bradford pear cultivars (the variety seen most often in northern Georgia) became immensely popular because they were developed as "sterile" plants that could not reproduce on their own. However, cross-pollination has resulted in a more aggressive tree (more like the original species) with thorns that grow up to 4-inches long and are strong enough to puncture a car tire.

Because these trees flower in early March, weeks before native flowering trees, they tend to suppress the growth rate of native saplings. They also block out the sun needed for wildflowers, which reduces available nectar for bees and other pollinators.

Another problem is the structure of the trees. The brittle quality of the wood and the steep "v" of the branches cause large limbs to crack and fall, particularly during storms. These traits contribute to a relatively short tree life (10-15 years), and the inherent weaknesses make the trees troublesome for homeowners. According to the College of Agricultural & Environmental Sciences at the University of Georgia, corrective pruning may help delay the limbs from breaking but does not prevent it.

The spread of Callery pears is primarily attributed to birds and small animals picking fruit from the trees and dispersing seeds, but a shallow root system also allows new shoots to grow. Without control, a single tree can quickly result in a dense thicket. The University of Georgia Center for Invasive Species and Ecosystem Health recommends pulling seedlings and shallow-rooted plants; soil should be moist. Larger plants require careful application of herbicides.

Basal bark treatments (generally for trees less than 6 inches in diameter) are consid-



ered one of the easier control methods, as they can be applied year-long and without cutting. Late winter/early spring generally is the most effective time to undertake this process because of the least amount of vegetation at the tree's base. The herbicide mixture is applied through a sprayer in a 12-inch-wide band around the tree base, making sure to cover the entire surface.

Other methods include foliar treatments, where herbicide is applied directly to leaves. This process is effective for small, dense patches and larger infestations where other trees are not at risk, but more herbicide is required. "Hack-and-squirt" treatments, using a hand ax to make an angled cut into the tree trunk and then injecting herbicide into the cut, are considered most effective in areas where desirable trees are located near the invasive trees. Fully cutting down trees is the most labor intensive...



and potentially most hazardous to people. It also is least effective in killing the root system. Treatment of the stump is recommended immediately after cutting down the tree. (For more about control methods, visit invasive.org.)

When looking to replace flowering trees, native alternatives include Eastern redbud, yellowwood and flowering dogwood.

#### **Alair Homes Decatur Wins Regional** Contractor of the Year Awards

lair Homes Decatur has been awarded three Regional CotY (Contractor of the Year) awards by NARI (National Association of the Remodeling Industry, nari.org). The winning projects were selected from more than 400 entries and judged against projects throughout the Southeast. Now, these projects will be entered into the national CotY Awards competition.

All three winning entries were from the renovation of a beautiful 100+-year-old house in Atlanta's historic Midtown neighborhood. Built in 1910, the home lacked a true primary suite, and the kitchen and bathrooms were outdated. The Alair project team took a potential teardown and transformed it into a neighborhood gem. The award-winning project was recognized with these awards:

Award for Residential Interior \$250,001 to \$500,000. Alair Decatur honored the home's historic beauty by refurbishing the original door hardware, front door, staircase, three fireplaces and layout (with some modifications). New materials for the bathrooms and kitchen seamlessly complement the home's historic charm, as well as an updated laundry room and new guest suite.

Award for Residential Exterior \$50,000 to \$100,000. At the front of the house, the team designed a historically appropriate covered second-story porch, which enhances the curb appeal, and adds much-needed space for the family to enjoy.

Award for Residential Interior Element under \$30,000. The new butler's pantry is a show stopper, with deep blue cabinetry, antiqued mirror tile, and a stained-glass window that was relocated from one of the home's former bathrooms. Open shelving stores and displays crystal barware, while cabinets and drawers provide additional storage, including a glass-front wine cabinet.







# "Where is Your Family Going?"

At the Decatur Parents Network Speaker Series event in February, parent coach Susan Morley, CLPC, CARES (CPS-AD), presented information and tools for families to create their own mission and vision statements.

Morley discussed how these two tools can offer families a guiding light to run more smoothly, reduce confusion and tensions, and become a better functioning unit. When decisions or issues come up, the family can look to their mission as a guide towards resolution. It is a method by which parents and children can check themselves and maintain stable expectations. To be successful, everyone should have a stake in the family's success. If done half-heartedly, conflicts and misunderstandings will continue. Susan recommends that families follow three pillars, purpose, values, and practice makes imperfect, to develop and

adhere to their commitments.

According to the Search Institute, a family mission statement also supports the 40 developmental assets that have a proven positive impact on young people. Children and teens who demonstrate these assets participate in fewer risky behaviors and exhibit positive values, such as leadership, good health, diversity, and success in school. The categories of developmental assets that benefit most from a family mission statement are:

- Support: Young people need to be surrounded by people who love, care for, appreciate, and accept them.
- Empowerment: Young people need to feel valued and valuable, and this happens when youth feel safe and respected.
- Boundaries and Expectations: Young

people need clear rules, consistent consequences for breaking the rules, and encouragement to do their best.

- Positive Values: Young people need to develop strong guiding values to help them make healthy life choices.
- Social Competencies: Young people need the skills to interact effectively with others, make difficult decisions, and cope with new situations.
- Positive Identity: Young people need to believe in their self-worth and feel they control what happens to them.

After decades of research, world-renowned Stanford University psychologist Carol S. Dweck, Ph.D., discovered the power of mindset. In her book "Mindset: The New





Psychology of Success," Dweck explores how success in school, work, sports, the arts, and nearly every area of human endeavor can be dramatically influenced by how we think about our talents and abilities.



The main festival takes place on Saturday, 10 a.m.-6 p.m., and Sunday, 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Find





## **DEF Celebrates 20 Years of Scholarships**

Established by a group of residents who believed that, collectively, the community could help Decatur students achieve their full potential, the Decatur Education Foundation team has grown from one employee to six, and currently invests more than half a million dollars annually to create and support programs that serve Decatur's kids.

While DEF focuses primarily on supporting all City Schools of Decatur students, the nonprofit also awards annual college scholarships to Decatur High School seniors. Over the past 20 years, DEF has helped families establish scholarships to honor Decatur students whose lives were cut short but who left their mark on our community. Other scholarships represent groups who want to support ambitious DHS students in achieving their post-secondary goals. Today, DEF awards 20 scholarships annually.

In 2002, DEF awarded its first college scholarship: The Sarah Lynn Woolf Memo-

rial Scholarship was awarded to DHS senior Gillian Connolly. The scholarship was established by Bill and Donna Woolf to honor the life of their daughter Sarah, a DHS student who passed away from bone cancer in 2002.

Recently, DEF caught up with Gillian to learn how the scholarship has helped her achieve her goals. After graduating from Earlham College, with a degree in Biology, Gil-

lian went on to work in community health in Boston. She then attended Emory University as a Fuld Fellow to become a family nurse practitioner. After completing the program, she returned to community health, serving a mostly Spanish-speaking community in Chicago. Today, Gillian is pursuing a Doctor of Nursing Practice at Vanderbilt Univer-




sity and working remotely to support an NP Fellowship Program that she helped to

For 20 years, the Sarah Lynn Woolf Memorial Scholarship has helped keep her memory alive for the Woolf family, while also serving fellow DHS seniors. Adding to the fund each year, Bill and Donna Woolf have increased the scholarship from a one-time annual award to

a renewable four-year scholarship valued at \$25,000. Like most of the awards administered by DEF, the Sarah Lynn Woolf Memorial Scholarship is awarded via teachernominations.
