DECATUR RECEIVES VOICE OF THE PEOPLE AWARD

National Research Center (NRC) at Polco and the International City and County Management Association (ICMA) have announced Decatur, Georgia, as the winner of the Voice of the People (VOP) awards for Excellence in Inclusivity/Engagement. The VOP awards are the only national awards that honor local governments based on feedback from residents.

Decatur's award recognizes its exceptionally high ratings on the National Community Survey (the NCS) and its intentional, data-informed decisions.

The National Community Survey (NCS) is a survey that provides a comprehensive and accurate picture of resident perspectives

on local government services, policies, and management. Results draw from the largest resident opinion database of its kind, representing more than 30 million Americans. The NCS compares local results with benchmarks compiled from surveys conducted across the United States.



UPDATE: School Property Tax Exemption

ccording to unofficial election results, the Nov. 2 referendum on newly proposed school property tax exemptions has passed. After the results have been certified by DeKalb County and declared by the City Commission, the new S-5 and S-6 exemptions will go into effect on Jan. 1, 2022.

The S-5 will provide an exemption on \$200,000 of assessed home value (\$400,000 of appraised value) for seniors age 65-69, if their household federal adjusted gross income is less than \$53,000. The S-6 exemption will qualify homeowners age 70 and above for a reduction of \$200,000 of assessed home value (\$400,000 of appraised value) without an income cap.

A separate S-3 partial school exemption for homeowners age 70 and above has been in effect since 2002. The majority of senior homeowners already have the S-3 on their accounts. Homeowners with the S-3 will be granted the new S-6 exemption automatically because the eligibility requirements for these two exemptions are the same. Homeowners who applied for the S-3 during 2021 for tax year 2022 will also automatically receive the S-6 exemption.

The city will begin accepting applications for the S-5 exemption after Jan. 1, 2022. Homeowners who turned 70 during 2021 and homeowners who are over 70 but never applied for the S-3 exemption will need to apply for the S-3/S-6 after Jan. 1. Applications will be due by March 15, 2022, to receive the exemption on the first installment property tax bills, which will be issued April 1, 2022.

In light of the COVID-19 pandemic, the city will allow an electronic option for filing new school homestead exemption applications. The application procedures haven't been finalized yet. Updates about application procedures will be posted at decaturga.com/homestead.

TALLEY STREET WALKING SCHOOL BUS

ABOUT THE BOARDS Better Together Advisory Board

The Decatur City Commission established the Better Together Advisory Board in 2016 to guide and advise the commission and the community around issues of equity, inclusion and engagement. The board also serves as advocate and advisor in implementing the recommendations of the Better Together Community Action Plan for Equity, Inclusion and Engagement. The plan contains specific action items for individuals, organizations, and local government to undertake to cultivate a just, welcoming, inclusive, equitable and compassionate city.

The board meets the first Tuesday of every month, 6:30-8 p.m., at Decatur City Hall, City Commission Conference room.

Active Living Board

Active Living Advisory Board members are appointed by the Decatur City Commission to serve as advocates and advisors to the Active Living Division on projects and programs that help citizens safely incorporate physical activity into their daily routines.

The board meets the first Tuesday of each month, 8 a.m., at the Decatur Recreation Center.

Environmental Sustainability Board

The Environmental Sustainability Board

(ESB) provides recommendations to the City Commission regarding the city's environmental regulations, plans and initiatives. The ESB also assists with implementation of city projects that affect the natural environment to protect and improve the quality of life for citizens and property owners in the city of Decatur.

Four active committees are responsible for researching specific issues and making recommendations to the board: Natural Systems, Resource Conservation, Energy and Transportation, and Education and Outreach. Upcoming projects for the ESB include the Green Restaurant Recognition program, festival waste management, the 2018 Decatur Focus Green Insert, and serving as liaisons for the Stormwater Master Plan.

The board meets the third Friday of each month at 8 a.m. at the Decatur Recreation Center.

Historic Preservation Commission

The commission was established by local ordinance to ensure that renovations and new construction in Decatur's five Local Historic Districts are consistent with the character of the neighborhood. The five districts are the McDonough-Adams-King's Highway District, Ponce de Leon Court, Old Decatur, Parkwood, and the Clairemont Historic District. The commission must approve exterior projects to homes located within these districts by issuing a Certificate of Appropriateness before a building permit can be issued. Some projects may be administratively approved through the issuance of a Certificate of Exemption.

The board meets on the third Tuesday each month at 6:30 p.m. at Decatur City Hall, City Commission Meeting room.

Zoning Board of Appeals

The Zoning Board of Appeals was established by local ordinance. It conducts public hearings on appeals from decisions of the zoning administrator and of the UDO administrator and considers requests for variances from zoning requirements.

The board meets on the second Monday of each month, 7:30 p.m., at Decatur City Hall, City Commission Meeting Room.

Lifelong Community Advisory Board

The Decatur City Commission authorized the creation of a Lifelong Community Advisory Board in 2013 to assist with the expansion and implementation of the city's Lifelong Community initiatives, including those in the 2010 Strategic Plan. One component of a Lifelong Community is the ability to age in place.

The board meets on the fourth Monday of each month, 6:30 p.m., at Decatur City Hall, City Commission Conference room.

Public Facilities Authority

The City of Decatur Public Facilities Authority (PFA) was created by the Georgia General Assembly in 2017. The PFA meets annually, typically in January, and thereafter as needed.

Friends of Decatur Cemetery's (FODC) Tuesday gardeners have uncovered another hidden treasure in the Old Section of Decatur Cemetery - a low brick wall surrounding the Orphans Home lot (tour stop 22). The large marker "Marble Hill Sunday School" belies the history of the site where lie the remains of 30 young children from Decatur's Methodist Children's Home, most of whom died in the early 20th century of common childhood maladies. Curiously, the home weathered the Pandemic of 1918 with no deaths.

For those unfamiliar with the Orphans Home, it was founded in Norcross in 1871



and later moved to Columbia Drive. Today that site is Legacy Park.

Next time you're wandering Decatur Cemetery, stop to admire the work of the "Tuesday Crew" and think about the young ones whose lives were part of the legacy of our popular Decatur greenspace.

Nandina and Chinese Holly

s part of the five-year woodland restoration and regeneration project at Legacy Park, Trees Atlanta, in partnership with the City of Decatur, is overseeing the removal of non-native invasive plant species on the site. Starting in December, efforts will focus on Nandina and Chinese holly.

With their evergreen leaves and red berries, holly plants are a celebrated symbol of winter. Because of their tolerance of drought, heat and cold, they also are popular low-maintenance additions to gardens. While the United States is home to several native holly varieties, the non-native Chinese holly (Ilex cornuta) in the U. S. dates to the early 1900s, to plants brought from China by a plant hunter named Frank Meyer, who worked for the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Chinese holly can grow as large shrubs, thick hedges or trees. It features dark green, glossy leaves with a lighter color underneath. Leaves are rectangular, 7 to 9 inches long, with four spines (one at each corner). In Georgia, a variety called Burford holly (named for Thomas Burford, who was superintendent of Atlanta's West View Cemetery) features rounded, shorter leaves of 2 to 3 inches.


While not part of the holly family, Nandina is another evergreen plant with berries (or "drupes") that is causing concern from invasive growth. Native to China, Japan and India, it was brought to the United States in the early 1800s as an ornamental plant. This leafy shrub can grow up to eight feet tall and features numerous stems that look like bamboo, earning it the common name of "Heavenly Bamboo" or "Sacred Bamboo." Leaves are 1- to 2-inches long, ovalshaped and pointed.

Both plants have an extensive root system that allows them to spread out in search of water and sprout in other areas. The berries, while toxic to humans and pets, are transported and dropped by birds, which also contributes to the plants' spread. (If ingested in large quantities, Nandina berries also may be toxic to birds.) In forested lands, dense thickets of both plants crowd out native plants and decrease biodiversity.

To remove Chinese holly, use clippers or a saw to remove branches until only the central stump remains. Use a shovel to gently dig around the shrub base, being careful not to cut off the supporting roots. (Leaving any roots will allow the holly to return.) Then, rock the plant back and forth until you can pull it out. (Deep-soaking the roots with water several days before may ease this process.) Revisit the area every two to three weeks to remove any roots left behind.

To remove Nandina, cut off flowerheads with pruning shears. Seedlings are easy to pull up by hand, but mature plants will require more extensive digging. Loosen the soil around the plant (about 6 inches from the base) with a garden fork, levering the soil upward. Dig as deep as possible until the plant starts to lift out of the ground. Work the fork under the base and lift out the plant. Be sure to remove all stray roots. Careful treatment with a weed killer may be required.

Dispose of invasive plant material carefully. The Georgia Invasive Species Task Force recommends bagging materials to help prevent their spread; freezing seeds, fruits and cuttings to make them nonviable; and pruning or removing invasive plants before they produce fruit or seeds. Always wear gloves and other protective clothing.





DHA Receives Awards for Trinity Walk and Oakview Walk

Decatur Housing Authority (DHA) has been honored nationally and regionally for its transformation of the former Gateway Manor and Oakview Apartments into Trinity Walk and Oakview Walk. Recent awards include:

- Award of Excellence from the Southeast Regional Council of NAHRO (National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials)
- Award of Merit from NAHRO
- Regional Excellence Honorable Mention from the Atlanta Regional Commission

The two apartment communities were revitalized over five years in three phases: Trinity Walk I & II (renovation of 121 units at 421 W. Trinity Place) and Trinity Walk III (razing and rebuilding 34 units at 111 Oakview Rd. and renamed Oakview Walk Apartments). The new construction replaced outdated, 50-year-old buildings with energy-efficient one-, two-, and three-bedroom apartments, plus numerous onsite amenities such as children's playgrounds, outdoor gathering spaces, raised garden beds and walking trails. Indoors, the centrally located community Resource Center features a fully equipped computer room, recreational area, kitchen, classrooms and laundry facility. The project was undertaken as a partnership between by DHA, the City of Decatur, Georgia Department of Community Affairs, U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), City Schools of Decatur, Hudson Housing Capital, Sugar Creek Capital and Bank of America Merrill Lynch.

Amplify Donates \$50,000 to Decatur Cooperative Ministry



mplify My Community has announced a \$50,000 gift to Decatur Cooperative Ministry (DCM) to support the organization's efforts to prevent and alleviate homelessness and poverty in Decatur and DeKalb County. The unrestricted gift was made possible by funds generated at the Amplify Decatur Music Festival, held in October, and is the largest in Amplify's history.

The festival was presented by Lenz and produced in partnership with Eddie's Attic. Amplify Decatur featured performances by Indigo Girls, John Paul White, Shawn Mullins, Rodney Crowell, Blind Boys of Alabama, The Cactus Blossoms Duo, Michelle Malone, and others.

DCM offers several housing and prevention programs, including:

• Hagar's House: An emergency night

shelter and assessment center, providing up to 90 days of night shelter for families with children.

- Family House: A transitional housing program, providing housing and supportive services to move families from homelessness to self-reliance in six months.
- Family Success: A program offering permanent supportive housing to chronically homeless families (those with extensive histories of homelessness who have at least one member with a diagnosed disability). Their families receive long-term support and services, ensuring lasting housing stability.
- **Project Take Charge:** A homelessness prevention program providing emergency assistance (in the form of rent/

mortgage and utility assistance) to at-risk families, seniors, and veterans in danger of eviction, foreclosure, or disconnection of utility services.

Sponsors include Leafmore Group, Decatur Package Store, Iris and Bruce Feinberg, Oakhurst Realty Partners, Natalie Gregory & Partners, Savannah Distributing Co., Three Taverns Craft Beers, and Creature Comforts Brewing Company.

To date, Amplify has donated more than \$450,000 to locally oriented anti-homelessness and poverty-focused organizations, including more than \$285,000 in Decatur.

Ask your child to check off all the assets they believe they have in their life – you might be surprised that there are many in place already.

Teach Your Children Well: Why Values and Coping Skills Matter More Than Grades, Trophies, or "Fat Envelopes," by Madeline Levine, PhD Confronting the real issues behind why we

push some of our kids to the breaking point

while dismissing the talents and interests of many others, Levine shows us how to shift our focus from the excesses of hyperparenting and the unhealthy reliance on our children for status and meaning to a parenting style that concentrates on both enabling academic success and developing a sense of purpose, well-being, and connection in our children's lives.

The Self-Driven Child: The Science and Sense of Giving Your Kids More Control Over Their Lives, by Ned Johnson & William Stixrud

The Self-Driven Child offers a combination of cutting-edge brain science, the latest discoveries in behavioral therapy, and case studies drawn from the thousands of kids and teens the authors have helped over the years to teach you how to set your child on the real road to success. As parents, we can only drive our kids so far. At some point, they will have to take the wheel and map out their own path. But there is a lot you can do before then to help them tackle the road ahead with resilience and imagination.

Too Much of a Good Thing: Raising Children of Character in an Indulgent Age, by Dan Kindlon, PhD Dr. Kindlon delineates how indulged toddlers become indulged teenagers who are at risk for becoming prone to, among other things, excessive self-absorption, depression and anxiety, and lack of self-control. 

CSD Transitions to New Fiber Network

he City Schools of Decatur recently transitioned to a fiber optic network jointly built with the City of Decatur. The new network, with an expected 20-year lifespan, provides built-in resilience not previously available, will lower operating costs, and eases CSD's implementation of future network enhancements.

The fiber network connects all CSD schools and the Facilities and Maintenance office to the district's network core in the Elizabeth Wilson School Support Center, which in turn provides the district's internet connection.

CSD tripled its internet bandwidth over the last year from 900 megabits per second to 3 gigabits per second, and each building in the fiber network has a 1 gb/s connection to the Wilson Center. The district plans to increase internet bandwidth to 6 gb/s in the

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coming years, and the new fiber network affords CSD greater flexibility to increase individual schools' connection rates to take advantage of that additional bandwidth – or even greater increases in the future.


The fiber project began in 2018, when then-Assistant City Manager Andrea Arnold invited CSD to participate in creating a system to serve municipal and school locations. The fiber-optic lines that connect CSD's buildings are physically separate from the city's fiber-optic lines, and the two entities' data are kept entirely separate. Network Cabling Infrastructures Inc.'s network design and construction involved 62,850 feet of underground boring and fiber placement over 335 days. Network construction ended in June, but equipment supply chain limitations delayed CSD's transition to the new network by several months.

Oakhurst Elementary Named National Blue Ribbon School

he United States Secretary of Education, Miguel Cardona, recognized 325 schools as National Blue Ribbon Schools for 2021. Oakhurst Elementary School was included in that number for its overall academic performance or progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups.

According to the press release issued by the U.S. Department of Education, "The coveted National Blue Ribbon Schools award affirms the hard work of educators, families, and communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging and engaging content."

The department recognizes all schools in one of two performance categories, based on



all student scores, subgroup student scores, and graduation rates:

- Exemplary High-Performing Schools are among their state's highest performing schools as measured by state assessments or nationally normed tests.
- Exemplary Achievement Gap-Closing Schools are among their state's highest

performing schools in closing achievement gaps between a school's student groups and all students.

Oakhurst was also recognized in the Exemplary High-Performing Schools category. The official ceremony will be held in Washington, D.C.
