Betty Blondeau Remembered at Legacy Park

ecatur native and long-time resident Betty
Blondeau was honored by
friends and associates with the
dedication of a white oak tree
(planted by Trees Atlanta) and memorial
plaque installed at Legacy Park on June
11. City Commissioner George Dusenbury made the dedication on behalf of the
City, highlighting Betty's years of engagement in Decatur's business and government affairs.

Betty's dear friend Mary Hinkel followed with memories of when the two were engaged in greater Atlanta's performing arts community where Betty served as director of development for the Alliance Theater and later True Colors Theater. Hinkel also touched on Betty's work in recent years as a key participant in the DeKalb Citizens Advocacy Council and its push for a strong board of ethics and transparency in county government.

Next, Kathie Gannon, chair of Decatur's Downtown Neighbors and former county commissioner spoke about Betty's involvement in Decatur's growing downtown community and DeKalb County government affairs as well as Betty's advocacy on behalf of the county each winter at the Georgia General Assembly.

Lastly, Winnona Park resident Lynne Rosner discussed Betty's involvement with Save Decatur's Trees and its work to reform the City's tree ordinance. Followed by Mayor Patti Garrett's reflections on Betty's presence as a citizen lobbyist on behalf of Decatur and DeKalb County issues as well as on matters that came before the Decatur City Commission.

The gathering concluded with heartfelt remembrances from two of Betty's three children, Laura Blondeau Robinson and Robert Blondeau.



The event included music by Betty's friends and neighbors Ann and Alan Abramowitz. Afterwards, the family shared mementos from Betty's life, including a photo album from her years at Clairmont Elementary (during WWII) and photos of Betty as a proud Decatur High School cheerleader in the early 1950s. Guests enjoyed refreshments prepared by Betty's family, including chocolate chip cookies and brownies using Betty's recipes and family favorite venison sausage meatballs prepared by her beloved son-in-law Joe Robinson. Betty passed away on October 2, 2021, after a sudden illness.

Progress Report:

UNICEF's Child Friendly Cities

he City of Decatur is one of only six local governments in the United States partnering with UNICEF to achieve recognition as a Child Friendly City. The distinction





is reserved for communities that elevate the needs of children in the following areas; safety and inclusion, participation, equitable social services, safe living environments, and play and leisure. In partnership with the Decatur Housing Authority, Decatur Education Foundation, City Schools of Decatur, the Decatur Youth Council, community members, and children and youth, City of Decatur wants to assure that all stakeholders contribute to the effort.

The City has achieved several milestones that will culminate in a final application in 2023:

- January 2020 MOU with UNICEF approved by city commission
- July 2021-January 2022 Government assessment data analysis of measures associated with child well-being
- September 2021 Decatur Youth Council members developed survey for assessments of youth/children aged; 6-8, 9-12 and 13-18
- April 2022 Surveys administered with coordination by Student Center Coordinators, Sabrena Shields (RMS) and Dianne Andree (DHS); interactive surveys administered at City of Decatur and Decatur Housing Authority afterschool programs for K-5th graders
- April/May 2022 Focus groups with middle and high school students to tally and analyze survey results and set priorities

Over the summer, the Youth Action Team developed a community engagement project to address the established priorities. The project is scheduled to begin in September, and by December the team will develop a local action plan. In Spring 2023, the City will submit the final application to UNICEF to become a Child Friendly City. Decatur Library Offers Care Kits


Librarians at DeKalb County Public Library (DCPL) are spearheading care kits to distribute to members of the community who are unhoused or experiencing other life challenges. The kits include hygiene and toiletry items such as wipes, shampoo, soap, toothbrushes and toothpaste, as well as socks and a washcloth. More than 350 care kits, funded by the DeKalb Library Foundation, will be given out in waterproof backpacks across DCPL's 23 library locations including Decatur Library.

Each year, librarians at DCPL work together to create an impactful group project. This project addresses the tie between personal hygiene and one's sense of self by providing community members with tools to maintain health and self-esteem.

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Collecting Clamshells – A Recycling Dilemma

Summer is here, and while many may head to the beach to collect shells, the City of Decatur reminds residents that the plastic, hinged "clamshells" that are often used for take-out meals and delicate fruits/vegetables are not worth collecting.

Clamshells fall into the category of hard-to-recycle materials that cannot be recycled curbside. While often made of recyclable material - polyethylene terephthalate (PET), or plastic #1 - these flimsy and lightweight containers are difficult to mechanically sort from the mixed recycling stream at the regional recycling facility.

For this reason, City of Decatur does not accept clamshells in curbside co-mingled bins. Instead, clamshells are often sent to landfill or burned to produce energy along with other recycling contaminants. These items should be disposed of with household trash or dropped in the designated bin for plastic #1 at Your DeKalb Farmer's Market or the Center for Hard to Recycle Materials (charm.org) in Atlanta. Both options are free.

And as a friendly reminder, please do not bag your curbside recycling; bags make the contents difficult to sort and damage equipment at our recycling facility. For more information about this topic and other tips from Decatur's Environmental Sustainability Board, visit decaturga.com/bc-esb.

Fall Prevention Initiative Kicks Off in Decatur

The Decatur Active Living Senior Program and Fire Captain Gary Menard partnered with Emory University's Community Learning and Social Medicine initiative (CLSM) to develop a fall prevention presentation for Decatur seniors. On Friday, June 10, Emory medical students Anisa Iqbal, Julia Ding, Morgan Bade, Nikhil Vettikattu, and Nithya Shanmugam presented to a group at the Phillips Tower independent living facility. The presentation ended with a Tai Chi demonstration by long-time Decatur instructor Neil Norton.

Fall prevention information is critical for older adults across the country. The CDC reports that more than one in four adults (28 percent), age 65 and older, report falling each year in the U.S. Decatur looks forward to working with the CLSM program and Emory students to make fall prevention part of the ongoing education for seniors in the Decatur community.

City Unveils New Composter at Scott Park Garden

ecatur Active Living and the Scott Park Community Garden held a compost ceremony on Thursday, June 2 to celebrate the installation of a new three-bin composting system. In November, Decatur Active Living applied for a grant from Food Well Alliance to fix and update the garden's existing system, which was in desperate need of repair. In January, DAL learned that they had been awarded a \$1,500 grant to update the existing system with a new rodent-proof "Compost Knox" composting system. DAL's Adult Program Leader Gael Doyle facilitated the grant opportunity, working closely with Jim Dillon, Murray Browne and Mike Pastirik — community garden members who volunteered more than 50 hours to build the composting system.

Scott Park Community Garden brings many benefits to the Decatur community. Established in 1992, the garden is tucked away in the "backyard" of the Decatur Recreation Center, beautifying the grounds and generating community pride and involvement. The organic community garden brings residents together, keeping them active while providing urban greenspace therapy. A dedi-

COD Internship Sparks Joy for DHS Student

Salmoncain Smith-Shomade is a 2022 graduate of Decatur High School, and among only 50 of 400 graduating seniors who earned an International Baccalaureate Career (IB Career) diploma. At DHS, the IB Career Diploma requires completion of a chosen career pathway and internship at a pathway-related workplace. When his career mentors suggested an internship with the City of Decatur Public Works Department, Smith-Shomade applied, and the opportunity proved to be more than a career path; it became a joyous and uplifting experience.

Decatur Public Works is unique in that it consists of three divisions; Cemetery Operations, Design, Environment and Construction (DEC), and Sanitation. Other city

governments may split these areas apart, but DPW fosters inter-departmental connectivity. While each division maintains its separate responsibilities, the staff's daily interactions create a sense of community

During his interview, Smith-Shomade noted that DPW staff smiled, laughed, and talked to each other, even greeting him as one of the team. A few weeks after his interview, he was invited to join the DEC division as an intern, and he felt welcome immediately. Shadowing different members of the DEC team, Smith-Shomade served in a variety of fields, including permitting, code compliance, company management, planning, arboriculture, and civil engineering. He toured construction sites and surveyed Decatur



through a public works eye. Whether learning a new concept or attending a meeting, Smith-Shomade felt that his input and contributions were welcome.

When asked to reflect on his work with Decatur DPW, Smith-Shomade uses words like unique, inspiring, joyous, sincere, supportive to describe the "best internship." He also offers gratitude for inspiring him to look towards a future career where he can experience the same joy.

Decatur Fire Celebrates Wellness in May

This past May, Decatur Fire participated in the inaugural Motivational Month of May Wellness Challenge where competitors battled to earn the title of "2022 Wellness Champion." Three shifts completed physical challenges including a 5k run, dragging a weighted training dummy around the station ten times, and climbing the training tower ten times while wearing an airpack. The competition was close, with A-Shift finishing on top with 65 points, followed by B-Shift with 62.

Decatur Fire highlights wellness for three reasons: First, the job is physically demanding, and the firefighter is the most important piece of equipment at the fire department. Second, cardiac arrest is the number one cause of death for firefighters. Third, most emergency responses are for emergency medical incidents, many of which are preventable.

Leading health issues like cardiac disease and Type 2 diabetes can be reduced through exercise and a healthy diet. By celebrating wellness, Decatur Fire aims to motivate others to embrace regular exercise, hydration, proper nutrition, and healthy recovery breaks. Dialing 911 in Decatur

The Decatur Police Department's 911 Center is responsible for all emergency and non-emergency calls within the city limits of Decatur for police, fire, and ambulance responses. Occasionally, calls received from cell phones on the borders of the city get routed to other call centers, which can be problematic during an emergency. If you use a cell phone to call 911, and you fail to reach the Decatur dispatch, hang up and call the non-emergency number at 404-373-6551. Decatur emergency operators are on duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week, so if you dial 911 and reach a recording then you have probably been routed to Atlanta or DeKalb. If you have any questions, please contact 911 Director, Police Lieutenant Barry Woodward at 404-373-6551.

Decatur Fire recommends that residents consider programming the non-emergency number into their cell phones to help ensure that COD first responders can be alerted and dispatched to your home without delay.

Brave Nu adVentures in Decatur

Brave Nu Ventures is launching "adult gap year" programs in Decatur this fall for people who want to experience adventures in Art & Social Change and Urban Agriculture. Offered August 28 through September 25, each four-week course presents a learning adventure that pairs expert seminars with a weekly lab. Participants choose a focus, Art & Social Change or Urban Agriculture, to gain an enhanced understanding of working with a non-profit.

Art & Social Change will work with Out of Hand Theater on an Equitable Dinner. Seminars will be presented by Museum of Design Atlanta and include a Decatur architecture tour that features the work of Leila Ross Wilburn, one of Atlanta's first female architects who designed several homes in the historic MAK district (McDonough-Adams-Kings Highway) of Decatur.

Urban Agriculture participants will work in a community garden with Food Well Alliance. Seminars will take place at Wylde Center in Oakhurst and include a farm-to-table session. Wylde Center Executive Director Stephanie Van Parys will discuss farmto-school initiatives and lead a garden-based demonstration.

As the home base neighborhood, Decatur will host out-of-town participants, with special rates at downtown hotels. In addition to the courses, participants can access weekly offerings featuring inspiring people and places, many of which are in the city:

- Maker Workshops: hands-on experiences like Design Thinking 101 at Decatur Makers
- Trailblazer Tours: outings to explore history and culture, including a civil rights walking tour
- Brave Nu Events: weekly lunches at independent Decatur restaurants - Chai Pani, Folk Art, D92 Korean BBQ and Universal

Programs are designed for remote workers or those with flexible schedules, who can dedicate 7-10 hours per week. Book online at bravenu.travel. Decatur residents receive a 20 percent discount with the code NU22.

Additionally, Brave Nu is offering a Decatur residency program. Two community members will be chosen to receive free access to one week of Brave Nu programming. ecatur's only all-girl Boy Scout Troop 4475 invites girls age 11-17 and their parents to attend an informational meet and greet. Troop 4475 was chartered last fall and is a partner with all-boy Troop 134. Around the country, all-girl troops share space and equipment with a boys troop and proceed through all the levels of scouting, up to and including the rank of Eagle.

Having separate all-girl troops helps empower girls as they learn to assume leadership roles, says Scoutmaster and Decatur resident Carroll McKoy Knabe who participated in Boy Scouts with her two sons; Davis, 20, an Eagle Scout and Griffin, 17, who holds the rank of Life and is working toward Eagle. Knabe believes that the structure of the program, which teaches leadership through the patrol method and camping, is fundamental to teaching girls how to become leaders.

Boy Scouts of America opened membership to girls in October 2017, and in 2018 parents of the boys in Pack 134, who also have daughters, wanted to include girls in scouting. In the winter of 2019, Decatur First Baptist Church approved the charter for P4475 for girls from K-5th grade. 

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Missing Middle Housing Forum



Salsa on the Square (6-8 p.m.) and La Choloteca After Party (8-10 p.m.), Saturday, Sept. 17



11th Annual Madison Avenue Derby Announces Race Date and New Organizers

Saturday, Oct. 15, 11 a.m., Madison Avenue, Decatur

Started in 2011 as a community project organized by a group of neighbors, the Madison Avenue Derby is a non-motorized racing event that challenges amateur racers to design and build human-powered soapbox cars that compete against the clock in a downhill race. Competitors are divided into age groups with awards for fastest times and most creative car themes.

The family-friendly event is free for spectators and features creatively-themed race cars, food vendors, and entertainment. Over the years, the event has grown from 20 competitors to more than 100 racers, with an estimated 1,000 spectators lining Madison Avenue to cheer them on.

Through local business sponsorships, participation by racers, and community giving, the Derby has raised more than \$200K for area nonprofits that serve the needs of children, including \$40K in 2021 for the Decatur Student Center.

The Madison Avenue Community Fund (MACF) is a 501(c)3 non-profit charitable organization, run by volunteers, that organizes the event and administers charitable giving. Derby co-founders Marco DiCarlo and Raul Trujillo have been overwhelmed by the community's support over the past decade. What began as a neighborhood fundraising event has grown, benefitting local nonprofits, and serving as a community builder for Decatur.

As DiCarlo and Trujillo step down, a new generation of neighbors has rallied to ensure the Derby and its philanthropy continues. Madison Avenue resident Jamie Burnett will help lead MACF and continue the tradition. The new organizers are currently working to identify a community beneficiary for the 2022 race.

Facts on Delta-8 from Decatur Parents Network

he Decatur Parents Network has fielded various questions and concerns from parents over the last year regarding Delta-8. What is it? What are the impacts? Is it legal? Delta-8 is one of the 100+ compounds found in the cannabis sativa plant. There are two common varieties of this plant: marijuana and hemp. The more familiar compound is Delta-9, predominantly found in the marijuana plant. Delta-8 is typically synthesized from cannabidiol (CBD) extracted from the hemp plant, and chemicals utilized in the extraction process are used to make commercial Delta-8 products. Trying to figure out what is in these products can be difficult as there is no current regulation of the extraction process.

Delta-8 is sold in vape cartridges, tinctures, and edibles (i.e. gummies, candies, etc.), and can be purchased legally in health food stores, gas stations, hemp and CBD

shops, and companies online by those 21 years and older. These products can relieve pain and produce feelings similar to Delta-9 but the reactions are described as milder. However, some reports show that the effects of Delta-8 may last up to five hours, and products can have the same known risks associated with Delta-9 as well as

unknown risks due to how it is made. Using Delta-8 products may also result in a positive THC drug screen.

With these similarities, one may wonder how Delta-8 is legal. In 2018, the Farm Bill legalized hemp farming as long as the plant contained less than 0.3% THC. This law also permitted the distribution and sale of hemp's byproducts, which opened the door for Del-




ta-8 products as an alternative to Delta-9. As Delta-8 has become more widespread, some states have moved to make it illegal, citing that it offers the same mood-altering effects as Delta-9.

As long as Delta-8 remains legal, DPN urges parents to talk with their children about the effects and potential risks. For more information, check
