This push for fire safety coincides with the 100th anniversary of Fire Prevention Week™, the longestrunning public health observance in the U.S. Each October, The National Fire Protection Association observes this week to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire, which began on October 8, 1871, and killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures, and burned more than 2,000 acres of land. Decatur at 200 CELEBRATING THE BICENTENNIAL THROUGHOUT THE YEAR

n December 10, 1823, the Georgia General Assembly approved a charter incorporating the City of Decatur and declaring it the seat of the then recently established county of DeKalb.

Over the past 200 years, Decatur has evolved and endured, through triumphs as well as missteps worthy of community reflection. Now, as the City prepares to embark on its bicentennial year, it is planning events and activities to celebrate this historic milestone.

Legacy Decatur – an affiliated 501(c)3 that works in support of the Decatur community — is

leading the charge, establishing a master calendar of events, and raising funds for projects that will sustain a lasting legacy for future generations of Decatur residents.

Over the course of 2023, we will celebrate the history that defines us by incorporating our bicentennial theme into a variety of events and activities, including February's Black History Month celebration, the annual Decatur Arts Festival, and festivities celebrating July 4th.

Special events — like a reprisal of the St. Patrick's Day parade from the mid-20th century marking Decatur's partnership with the Irish Olympic Committee in 1996 and the 200th anniversary celebration of the founding of Decatur First United Methodist Church in April 2023 — will also be included. As will our neighborhoods and local community organizations, who are invited and encouraged to plan their own activities.

In addition, we're also working towards the future, leaving a legacy for generations to follow, through the launch of our Bicentennial Fund endowing three supporting projects:

- The 200 Stories project, a year-long effort a la Story Corps to collect 200 stories from a broad representation of Decatur residents;
- The 200 Trees project, in partnership with Trees Atlanta, to plant and map 200 trees across the city's front yards and public spaces; and the
- Decatur Land Trust Future Fund in support of its long-term efforts to protect and provide affordable housing opportunities in Decatur, today and in the future.



Decatur Signals Proposed Zoning Change

early 600 blue public hearing signs are popping up around town. These signs are in compliance with House Bill 1405, recently passed by Georgia State Legislature, which requires the posting of signs every 500 feet in areas where proposed zoning changes, if adopted,

would allow for a greater diversity of housing types beyond single-family homes. As Decatur seeks to address "missing middle housing," the City is reconsidering allowing the construction of compatibly-sized duplexes, triplexes, and quadplexes.

Why are these proposed changes necessary when Decatur already has duplexes, triplexes, and quadplexes in its neighborhoods? All housing types except for single-family homes were disallowed in Decatur's neighborhoods in 1988. As much of the remaining stock has been converted or redeveloped to single family homes, the city is experiencing a considerable decline in income, age, and racial diversity.

Why is Decatur considering this zoning change? Over the past 15 years, citizens have consistently expressed concern for diminishing diversity, resulting in a variety of initiatives, and culminating as a recommendation of the 2020 Affordable Housing Task Force adopted as a goal of Destination 2030: the City of Decatur 2020 Strategic Plan.

How would this recommendation broaden economic diversity? Human diversity follows housing diversity. Expanding options for homebuilders and affordable housing providers like the Decatur Land Trust helps serve a wider range of incomes. Allowing existing homes to be sub-divided into additional units increases choice and flexibility for Decatur homeowners for downsizing and additional rental income. Creating opportunities for rental or home ownership for middle income and workforce earners supports economic diversity.

What are the next steps? City of Decatur will bring two proposed modifications to the Unified Development Ordinance before the Planning Commission and the City Commission. For meeting dates and times, refer to the nearest blue sign:



Decatur's Moonlight Graham

Sam Frankel Mayer (1893-1962) is the only known Major League Baseball player buried in Decatur Cemetery, in Section 10 near Glenlake Park. Mayer's brief (one month) MLB career was spent with the Washington Senators in September 1915, where he hit a respectable .241 (with one home run). While his career wasn't regarded the same as "Moonlight Graham," who was celebrated in the W.P. Kinsella novel "Shoeless Joe" and the movie "Field of Dreams," Mayer was considered a fine defensive outfielder, playing 17 seasons in the minors, including seven years with the Atlanta Crackers. After WWI, Mayer continued his career with a barnstorming group of baseball players throughout the Midwest and Northeast before resettling in Atlanta where he married, raised a family, and traded the baseball life for that of a salesman rather than a lifesaving doctor as in "Field of Dreams."

Sam's brother Erskine Mayer was a more notable baseball player, playing with the Phillies, Pittsburgh and finally the White Sox where he quit in disgust following the 1919 Black Sox Scandal. Erskine never played again and eventually moved to California. The talented Mayer boys were raised in a Jewish home by parents of German ancestry who came to Atlanta from Ohio. The family had deep musical roots going back to Prussia where their father was a concert pianist. Plan an Escape

Every year the National Fire Protection Association announces a new theme for fire prevention month. This year, the theme "Fire won't wait, plan your escape!" is particularly important because modern construction materials are composed of plastics which burn hotter, faster, and release dark, deadly smoke and toxins. The thick, black smoke can obscure a path out and the poisonous, combustible by-products can cause unconsciousness in seconds. You may have as little as two minutes (or



even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance planning. Decatur Fire Rescue recommends a comprehensive escape plan, including:

- Smoke alarms in every bedroom for early alerting,
- Evacuation plan that works for people of all ages and abilities to exit quickly and safely,
- Each room has two ways out,
- Practice at night when visibility is limited,
- A safe meeting place outside.

Check Smoke Alarms

Homes now burn faster and hotter, so it's important to ensure that there are enough working smoke alarms in your home to detect smoke and fire as soon as possible, especially at night when you're asleep. Without smoke alarms, the deadly gases created by the plastics in our homes can overtake us in our sleep before we ever know there is a fire. If you have any questions regarding the placement or number of smoke alarms in your home, please reach out to Decatur Fire. Don't take any chances with this crucial first step in getting you and your family out quickly in the event of a fire.



Kitchen Fires and Extinguisher Use

One of the most frequent causes of home fires is cooking incidents. While keeping a clean cooking area and never leaving cooking food unattended can help prevent fires, it's equally important to maintain a working fire extinguisher and to know how to use it. Decatur Fire offers the following tips:

- Store extinguishers away from the oven but easily accessible
- Ensure extinguishers aren't expired and the needle is still in the green
- Start from a distance and move closer if necessary
- Aim at the base, not at the flames to extinguish the actual object that is burning
- Sweep back and forth across the base until the fire is fully out
- Practice using the extinguisher; remove the pin and know how to squeeze the handle

Don't ever attempt to use an extinguisher on a fire that is too large or if you don't have a clear, unobstructed path to get out. If the fire doesn't go out, leave immediately. If the fire does go out, call Decatur Fire to make sure there's not a hazard. FLOODPLAIN INFORMATION AVAILABLE

The Decatur Public Works department provides general floodplain information on property located within the incorporated city limits. The Decatur Library also provides references on flooding and flood protection. A map and information service, available for a \$10 fee, explains:

- If a property is in a special flood hazard area
- If a property is in a floodway
- Flood insurance rate map information
- Flood depth information
- If a FEMA elevation certificate for a property is available in city records. An accurate street address or DeKalb Coun-

Leaf Them Be

Autumn brings cooler weather and trees radiating brilliant colors of red, yellow, and orange. For the City of Decatur, a designated Tree City of the World by the Arbor Society, fall also brings lots of leaves on the ground. This year as you plan your fall cleanup, consider leaving the leaves in the natural areas of the yard instead of bagging them to be hauled off as litter to a landfill. Letting the leaves remain on the ground has many environmental benefits, including:

- natural soil amendment that builds and fertilizes soil while hindering weeds
- food and habitat for bees, butterflies, beetles, and moth pollinators
- food, habitat, and nesting material for birds during the winter
- insulation for plant roots
- habitat for hibernating frogs, salamanders, and snakes

- food for decomposers such as snails and worms that create soil and provide food for songbirds
- retains soil moisture and reduces stormwater runoff

Allowing the leaves from your trees to remain on the yard also saves money in lawn bags, mulch, or trips to the store; reduces carbon emissions; limits noise in the community from leaf blowers; and gives back the time spent picking up leaves to do something else on a beautiful fall weekend. Did you know:

- Fireflies spend their first two years underground and under leaves.
- Raking leaves off your lawn into side beds or other areas provides benefits.
- Mowing leaves into smaller pieces makes them less obvious and adds nutrients to your lawn.

Team Name: Team Snoopy Awards: Most Creative Car - 2021

Inspiration: We've done a few more conventional cars, including a coupe, Trans Am and Ghostbuster car but wanted to try something different. Originally, we considered building a Delta jet but there were too many curves, so we decided to build a bi-plane, which ended up being more fun in the end.

Build Time: Off and on, we worked on it for a month, but as usual, the last couple days were a little frantic to finish; we attempted the first test run the night before Race Day. It's become a tradition it seems to finish at the last minute.

Why We Race: We have always enjoyed working together as a group, and we have lots of "natural tinkerers" in the gang. Mostly, it's a great way to spend time together and share a beverage or two. Fun Fact: While our build was much heavier, the wings were built using an actual "spar and stringer" technique - not too different from how they built the wings 100 years ago.

Advice for Future Builders: Start early, and make sure it's stable and safe. Use your creativity, I have seen some wonderful creations over the years. Lots of talented people out there!

Family-Owned Journeyman Launches in Decatur

In August, the Morris family – Decatur residents since 2007 launched Journeyman in downtown Decatur. In addition to providing bicycle repair, build, and customization services, Journeyman serves as a makerspace for local artisans to collaborate and sell items that are "bike-adjacent," such as bags, baskets and more. The vendors are rotational, giving shoppers incentive to return frequently for new offerings. Journeyman also offers outdoor cycling classes and meet-up opportunities for riders of all skill levels to connect and explore metro Atlanta, trails, and neighborhoods.

An experiential retail concept, Journeyman came to fruition with the support of the Decatur Downtown Development Authority's re-

tail incubator program, which has been providing opportunities for entrepreneurs to bring their ideas to life in brick-and-mortar spaces since August 2021. Located next door to the Visitor's Center at 115 Clairemont Avenue, Journeyman will host a belated ribbon-cutting ceremony in early October. 




Author Barbara Kingsolver in Conversation

Agnes Scott Earns Top Rankings

For a fifth year in a row, Agnes Scott College has been recognized as the nation's most innovative liberal arts college according to *U.S. News & World Report.* The college also maintained its #1 spot for first-year experiences, placed #3 for learning communities and rose to #3 for study abroad and #6 for senior capstone, among all U.S. higher education institutions. Among liberal arts colleges, Agnes Scott ranked #3 for best undergraduate teaching and #7 for social mobility.

Additionally, Agnes Scott stayed in the Best Southeastern, Best Value and Most Green colleges lists. And due to the college's relationship with the City of Decatur, it earned the top spot for the "Town-Gown Relations are Great" ranking. The relationship between Agnes Scott and the City of Decatur has grown closer in recent years — they've recently finalized a shared climate resiliency plan. And in July, Agnes Scott was awarded a \$750,000 Mellong Foundation grant to create the "Acknowledging our Past: Acting Now for A Transformed Future" project, in which the college will partner with the City.


