Decatur Celebrates Earth Day Every Day Become a Climate Activist!

s Decatur celebrates its 200th anniversary, there are many reasons to be proud and excited about our city. One big reason is Decatur's commitment to addressing the climate emergency. During the 2020 Strategic Planning process, Decatur citizens asked for climate action to be one of the city's top priorities. City leaders responded by creating the Energy and Sustainability Manager posi-

tion and funding the creation of a Clean Energy Plan. Adopted last September, the plan's commitment supports the worldwide scientific community's guidelines to combat global warming. And it aims to do so in a way that will improve living conditions and address equity issues in Decatur.

In another bold move, the City joined forces with Agnes Scott College to create a Climate Resiliency Plan. The goal is to work together on projects that protect and enhance the community, ranging from emergency preparedness and response to creative renewable energy solutions. But this is only the beginning; to achieve these goals requires policy and action at higher levels of government. By joining together to advocate as a community, we can create a healthy and livable Decatur and world for the next 200 years and beyond.

Decatur Partners with SCAD to Collect 200 Stories

The City of Decatur has partnered with the Savannah College of Art and Design (SCAD) through its SCADpro program to support the city's bicentennial celebration. During the year-long partnership, SCAD students are collecting stories and developing creative materials to promote the city's milestone anniversary.

The first phase of the collabora-

tion has launched, with SCAD students developing special recording technology that is being used to preserve the dynamic stories of Decatur residents. The 200 Stories initiative, which is modeled after StoryCorps, will record and archive 200 stories of a diverse cross-section of the Decatur community. All stories will be recorded, with some being used to create a visual record through film or animation and shared at the official community celebration event.

SCAD students will be collecting stories from community members, past and present, Saturday, April 1 through May 15 at Legacy Park, 500 S. Columbia Dr. For those interested in participating, recordings will take place on Wednesdays from noon to 8 p.m. and on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. To make an appointment, email 200stories@decaturga.com. Walk-ins are also welcome.

Other partners for the 200 Stories initiative include Agnes Scott College and StoryCorps.

CORRECTION

Decatur's Tree Canopy Conservation Ordinance

In the March issue of the Decatur Focus, the New Resident Guide included an outdated summary of Decatur's Tree Ordinance. Key elements of the new Tree Canopy Conservation Ordinance include the following:

- Residents may no longer remove three healthy trees every 18 months.
- A minimum tree canopy coverage of 60% is required on single-family residential properties.
- All permitting is now submitted/reviewed online through Community Core permitting.
- A tree permit is required to remove dead, diseased, and/or hazardous trees. City arborists are available to assist in permitting the removal of dead trees.
- Any demolition, building, or development activity must comply with Tree Canopy Conservation Ordinance requirements.

Decatur First United Methodist Church Celebrates 200 Years

City of Decatur is not the only one celebrating a milestone in 2023; Decatur First Methodist marks its bicentennial this month with a variety of activities, culminating with a homecoming service in the Sanctuary on Sunday at 11 a.m., presided by Bishop Robin Dease of the North Georgia Conference. The community is invited to a picnic lunch on the front lawn after the service.

Throughout its history, the church has sought to couple its spiritual witness with its social witness. Decatur First works closely with the City of Decatur, Decatur Emergency Assistance Ministry, Decatur Cooperative Ministry, and other organizations to support community members in need. Last year, the church gave away more than \$400,000 to mission, service, and social causes in the Decatur community and beyond.

For the last several years, the church has partnered with A Home for Everyone in DeKalb to offer a warming shelter on cold nights for those suffering from homelessness. The church also has a rich history of supporting human rights from the Civil Rights movement in the 1960s to the LGBTQ+ rights movement of today. In 2020, Decatur First established an endowed scholarship in memory of John Lewis through Georgia State University in support of the African American Male Initiative at GSU.

Originally housed in The Chapel on Sycamore, the current site of the church is located on E. Ponce de Leon, just down the street from the city square. Come and worship at DFUMC on Sundays at 9 a.m. (under the tent, weather permitting) and 11 a.m. in the Sanctuary and online at decaturfirst.org.



Letterboxing A FAMILY ADVENTURE TO EXPLORE DECATUR

Looking for your next family adventure and a new way to explore? Try letterboxing. Started in England in 1854, the activity has evolved into a worldwide "scavenger hunt" that combines outdoor fun with a dash of creativity—and you can start your quest here in Decatur.

HOW DOES IT WORK: Letterboxes are hidden in public, outdoor places and each container houses a rubber stamp, ink pad, and logbook.

- Each "letterboxer," or searcher has their own signature rubber stamp and personal logbook
- Use clues to find one of the secret letterboxes
- Letterboxers complete a stamp exchange to mark the occasion

GET STARTED: Supplies

- Ink pad, notebook and pen
- Pick a "trail name" (register your trail name for free on atlasquest. com)
- Signature stamp—use a rubber stamp you own or create an original stamp.

FIND LETTERBOXES:

Visit atlasquest.com

- This online resource lists "clues" within a 15-mile radius of your ZIP code
- Choose a clue, then explore and observe things in a new way as you hunt
- Search for 140+ hidden letterboxes
- Be on the lookout for a recent letterbox planted by Decatur Girl Scout Troop 21729 as part of earning their letterboxing badge

MISSION ACCOMPLISHED: After you've found the box

- Be "sneaky" by moving the box away from its hidden location to prevent accidentally revealing it to anyone that could be watching
- Do your stamp exchange
- Return the box and its contents to its original location for the next letterboxer to find

Legacy Park Removes Invasive Plants, including Callery Pear

Since November, Trees Atlanta has been working to eradicate invasive evergreen ground cover (English ivy, monkey grass, wintercreeper, and vinca) throughout the park, as well as removing invasive trees and shrubs surrounding the marsh and old ropes course. As we welcome spring, work is shifting to chipping brush piles and spreading mulch on trails for erosion control and to improve the aesthetics of the park. The crew also is removing large Callery pears that have invaded the park yet comprise much of its canopy.


According to Trees Atlanta, uprooting established Callery pear plants is difficult because of their extensive root system. Instead, the organization recommends cutting trunks with a hand saw within an inch of the ground and treating the stump within five or 10 minutes with a high-concentration (20 to 50 percent) glyphosate-based solution. If you do not want to use herbicide, make a cut one foot above the ground and use pruners or a hand saw to remove new growth as soon as it appears. Eventually, the roots will starve and kill the plant.

Native replacements for Callery pears include Carolina silverbells, shadbush/serviceberry and fringe trees. In smaller yards, consider chaste tree, cherry blossoms, southern crab apples and smaller varieties of crape myrtle (not the tall Natchez cultivar).

Invasive Plant Highlight: CALLERY PEAR / BRADFORD PEAR

The white flowers of ornamental pear trees are a sign of spring in much of the eastern United States. Unfortunately, these showy forerunners also have become one of the top invasive plant species in many parts of the country. In Georgia (and Decatur particularly), the Callery (orBradford) pear cultivar joins Chinese privet and kudzu at the top of our local invasive plants list.

Introduced to the U.S. from China a century ago, Pyrus calleryana initially was seen as a way to save valuable edible pear orchards in the Pacific Northwest that had succumbed to fireblight—a contagious bacterium that can destroy an entire orchard in a growing season. During the 1950-60s, the Bradford cultivar



In the 1980s, horticulturists began to detect problems with species; as the trees aged, they became more brittle and would break apart during wind storms or after heavy snowfall. Other cultivars were developed to replace Bradfords—whitehouse, redspire, autumn blaze (on the West Coast); aristocrat (Kentucky); and Cleveland select (Ohio). However this resulted in allowing previously "sterile" trees to cross-pollinate with other cultivars.

The ability to cross-pollinate has contributed to the invasive nature of the trees. In the past 20 years, they have started appearing at forest edges, in wetlands, along roadsides, and within forests. Warmer temperatures also have allowed the trees to spread to previously colder climates (like Wisconsin), where it was thought they could not survive. These wild growths produce dense thickets that inhibit wildlife movement and thorns large enough to puncture a car or tractor tire. Their early leafing also shades out native plants.

Because they are fast growing, inexpensive, and tolerant to difficult growing conditions, Callery pear cultivars continue to be popular today. According to the US Department of Agriculture, sales of the trees exceeded \$23 million in 2009. Horticulturists, however, have advocated for phase-out of the trees from commercial production to replace them with suitable regional alternatives. They also recommend replacing the trees as they break or decline. Trees Atlanta has an online resource for replacement trees at treesatlanta.org/resources/50-atlanta-trees.


2023 BLACK HISTORY PROGRAM


Decatur Cemetery Spotlight

Emily Verdery Battey, Journalist (1826-1912)

A Georgia native, Battey was considered one of the South's most gifted writers and lecturers. Widowed early, she moved to New York City in 1870 to pursue her writing career, and became known throughout the country for her articles in various New York newspapers and



journals. In 1875, Battey was hired by the *New York Sun* as an editor, becoming one of the earliest salaried women reporters in the United States. She continued in that position until 1890 when she returned to Georgia. Battey was also an accomplished lecturer, well acquainted with the many women's causes of the late 19th century—social, political, literary, and religious. Battey is buried in the Old Section of Decatur Cemetery with her sister and brother-in-law, Col. John Prather (walking tour #30). KIDS' FEST • Saturday, May 6, 10 a.m.-2 p.m.


Bring the family and enjoy Kids' Fest, with inflatables, kid-friendly performances, crafts, and more.

Pitching in Where Decatur Students Need it Most


With community activities back in full swing, it's easy to think that life has returned to "normal." But the pandemic continues to impact student retention and learning and adversely affect some Decatur families economically. Decatur Education Foundation has supported the needs of Decatur students for more than 20 years, often going above and beyond the classroom.

Lighten the Load was created in 2018 to provide supplemental food for students and families experiencing food insecurity. DEF helps fund weekend backpacks at five schools and stocks snacks for the pantry at Beacon Hill Middle School. Preparing for college or post-high school plans can be a scary notion for many high schoolers. DEF established the **FOCUS Prep program** (Finding Opportunities to Create your Success), which pairs community volunteers ("coaches") with high school students to offer guidance and assistance. Currently, the program supports 33 9th-12th graders, with plans to expand to more students next year. FOCUS works closely with College Ave Consulting to assure coaches have the training and resources to help their students. Decatur Career Academy Prepares Students for Success

City Schools of Decatur's goal to build a foundation for students to be their best, achieve their dreams and make the world a better place comes to life with the authentic experiences students receive through the Decatur Career Academy (DCA). Located at Decatur High School, the DCA serves students in grades 9-12 and offers 14 in-demand career pathways categorized into six clusters (Architecture & Construction, Audio & Video, Education & Training, Hospitality & Tourism, Information Technology, and JROTC).

After completing pathways within these clusters, students have transferable soft skills and are prepared to experience work-based learning as a senior in high school, preparing themselves for both entry-level career opportunities and transition to college.

The DCA also offers four Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO), including SkillsUSA, FCCLA, CTI, and First Robotics. Being a member of a CTSO helps students gain career, leadership, and personal skills that set them apart and maximize their productivity not only in the workforce but at home and in the community.

Another unique characteristic of the DCA is that students can receive training in state-of-the-art labs, earn college credits, and participate in job shadowing and internships without leaving the DHS campus. Currently,

DCA has more than 100 students participating in work-based learning, placed as student interns across the district. Students also participate in national organizations that offer competitions, travel, and scholarships.

Departments within the DCA often work together through project-based learning. In December 2022, culinary, AV/tech, and



JROTC students collaborated on the Bake for Good program: DHS culinary students baked and packaged loaves of bread to donate to The Sycamore House, DHS JROTC delivered the bread, and the audio/visual class made a mini-documentary of the process (vimeo. com/810309082).

In February, Dr. Fehrman facilitated a Teach-

ing as a Profession class, answering thoughtful questions from aspiring educators and encouraging students to stay passionate about being positive change-makers for their community and the world. By offering authentic and exceptional career pathway experiences, the DCA equips students to excel and succeed.
