Sidewalks: Keeping them Clear, Safe, and Clean is a Responsibility We All Share

ecatur residents invest millions of tax dollars in the installation and maintenance of sidewalks, but often pedestrians find themselves in situations where residential landscaping has grown over the sidewalk or slippery leaves and landscape debris make the passage unsafe. Overgrown landscaping can also limit the visibility at intersections for drivers which can lead to accidents.

Per City code, residents are responsible for the upkeep and de-littering of their property all the way to the curb. Prune all plants so they are behind the edge of the sidewalk and make sure there is at least seven feet of clearance above the sidewalk so that pedestrians are not impeded by bushes or low branches as they walk.

Please keep the sidewalk in front of your home clear of debris and vegetation in every season. Your neighbors depend on you to help keep the neighborhood safe for pedestrians and other vulnerable users along with motorists. Questions? 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Georgia State Senator Recognizes Beacon Hill Black Alliance for Human Rights

In February, State Senator Elena Parent introduced a resolution recognizing and commending the Beacon Hill Black Alliance for Human Rights for its contributions to the Decatur community and beyond.

The Beacon Hill

Black Alliance for Hu-

man Rights empowers,

advocates, educates, and

organizes people of African descent affected by systemic racism and oppression on issues of equity in education, housing, and the legal system, moving the City of Decatur and surrounding communities towards co-operative economics. Some of the many victories and most notable achievements of the Alliance include supporting the development of the first-ever Black Student Unions at both Decatur High School and Beacon Hill Middle School; co-sponsoring and organizing the Take Down White Supremacy March and Rally; successfully advocating for the re-hiring of an African-American police officer in the city of Decatur; coordinating efforts to remove monuments to white supremacy in the Decatur Square, including the Confederate "Lost Cause" obelisk and the "genocide cannon"; and sponsoring and fundraising for "Art for the People," a public art project that puts works created by artists of African and Indigenous descent on display in the City of Decatur, including the installation of "What Sonia Said," a sculpture by Ellex Swavoni celebrating Black communities.

The Praise House Comes to Decatur

rtist-activist Charmaine Minnifield introduces The Praise House Project to the Decatur Community to celebrate the African American history of the area and the legacy of Beacon Hill. The public art installation will be on view until June 2, with interior access on Fridays and Saturdays from 12-5 p.m.

The project is a communitybased initiative which places multimedia, site-specific public art installations within communities to uphold the African American



histories of the area. Each small wooden structure offers an immersive digital projection installation created from historic archives and a curated sound installation, inviting remembrance and community, like praise houses once before.

The Praise House Project at Beacon Hill will remember the historic community, referred to as "The Bottom", established during Reconstruction as a freedmen's town. Though Beacon Hill became a burgeoning Black residential and business district, populated by newly freed individuals who worked and raised their families in the area, the community was largely destroyed by the FDR Housing Act of 1937, leveling the shotgun houses, displacing generations of families to make room for public housing and city offices.

The installation acknowledges the legacy of Black resilience and achievement that continues today in spite of this far too common history of erasure for Black freedmen's towns, the recent establishment of the African American collection at the DeKalb History Center which includes a historic Freedmen's Bureau registry, as well as the recent removal of a nearby Confederate Obelisk, and the history of labor in the area, including that of Agnes Scott College, the artist's alma mater.

How Heat Pumps Can Make Decatur Homes More Energy Efficient

The use of heat pumps in homes is growing due to their energy efficiency when compared to gas furnaces.

A heat pump is an air conditioner that runs both ways. In the summer it transfers heat from inside your home to the outside, cooling your residence like an AC. In the winter, it takes heat from the air outside and brings it inside to warm your dwelling like a furnace.

Heat pumps are two to four times more efficient than gas furnaces. They are electric, so they do not burn fossil fuels in basements or crawl spaces. Heat is just moved either in or out of our homes. They also avoid the "meat locker" versus the "sauna effect" by providing more comfortable temperature control and keeping your house at a constant temperature and humidity.

A heat pump for an average-sized



house in Decatur can save up to 1,500 pounds of CO2 per year or 15 tons over a 20-year lifetime. This is based on calculations using an online savings tool on Rewiring America's, an electrification nonprofit, website.

Economics can also be a big benefit. Heat pumps are currently slightly more expensive than traditional gas or oil furnaces, but the Inflation Reduction Act gives a tax break or a rebate for installing a heat pump, which can range from \$2,000 to \$8,000, depending on income level. Then you can further save money with the increased efficiency of a heat pump.

In Decatur, there are 1,267 households that have a "severe energy burden." Residents of these households pay more than 10% of their income toward electricity or gas compared to the national average of 3%. Much of this cost is due to poor weatherization, insulation, or sealing, which allows energy to seep out the ceiling, walls, and windows. There are at least 3,000 other dwellings in our city that are in need of upgrades based on when they were built and the building codes at the time. The findings of homes suffering "severe energy burden" in Decatur were found using a GEM tool to map the City of Decatur's four main census tracts by Greenlink Analytics.

Two things can be done to lower the amount of energy used. The first is to weatherize. The second is to use more efficient heating and cooling. Using a heat pump can help improve energy efficiency.

When is the best time to install a heat pump? Do not wait until your furnace or your AC breaks down and plan ahead with these three steps:

- **1**. Get an energy assessment of your home completed.
- 2. Weatherize and seal your home so it is efficient.
- **3**. Take the pledge to go with a heat pump when the time is right.

What's the pledge? It's a commitment to plan and then act. Go to decatur100.com/pledge to learn more. Tips to Reduce the Number of Mosquitos in Your Yard This Summer


Here are some tips to help you reduce the number of mosquitos in your yard this summer. These steps can be taken today, before the start of mosquito season, and will not impact pollinators.

1. Walk your property looking for containers and other items that may collect water after it rains. Empty them and then store them away from rain or flip them over to prevent pooling of water. Mosquitos need water to breed so eliminating water is key to reducing mosquito populations.

Do not forget to clean out your gutters. These are hidden breeding areas for mosquitos. Water should run freely and not be blocked by leaf debris.

2. Put "mosquito dunks" in standing water such as bird baths and ponds. They act by killing the mosquito larvae before they can become adults, and they are safe for birds and bees.

3. Use an attractant. Traps that attract mosquitos and lure them to lay their eggs in a bucket, called "adult mosquito larvae traps" online, can be an effective control method. These buckets trap the eggs so that once they hatch, the mosquitoes cannot escape to bite you or reproduce. Put these buckets out now and ask your neighbors to do the same – you will notice a significant decrease in mosquitos around your yard.

Cafe Alsace, a French Tradition in Decatur

Café Alsace is a French restaurant that specializes in food from the Alsace region which is located in the northeast of France bordering Germany and Switzerland. The café has been open for almost 27 years and is owned by Benedicte Cooper.

Benedicte is from Colmar, France and has been involved in the restaurant industry for several years. She was previously the manager of the St. Agnes Tea House that was on Howard St. and worked at another French restaurant that was in Decatur. She decided to open the café after the landlord of 121 East Ponce de Leon Ave. reached out to her and asked her if she would be interested in taking over a recently vacated space. When not in the front greeting guests or serving them meals, you can find Benedicte helping in the kitchen or managing the daily operations of the restaurant.

She believes that human connection and personal touch are important components needed in business and life. Benedicte says that she loves Decatur because it is the closest thing to a small European town, and she is thankful for the support from the community over the years.

Facility Updates

The McKoy Dugout Renovation project is complete. The project includes renovations to the first base dugout, the removal of the chain link fence behind home plate, and the addition of netting along with various concrete enhancements to the facility. The first base dugout now features a new storage room, changing area, new steps, rails, drainage system, and roofing. These upgraded dugouts will cater to Decatur Parks and Recreation adult softball and Decatur High School baseball needs.

The Ebster Multi-Use Field is temporarily closing for several months starting in April for renovations. Located at Ebster Park in Decatur, the field will be converted from natural grass to synthetic turf. Additionally, a state-of-the-art LED athletic field lighting system is being installed to facilitate evening activities throughout the fall, winter, and spring seasons. The revamped field will be lined for various sports.

Be on the lookout for community input meetings regarding the Ebster Teen Outdoor Recreation Area. The City of Decatur was awarded a \$2.08 million grant from Governor Kemp's Improving Neighborhood Outcomes in Disproportionally Impacted Communities program. The funding will propel Decatur Parks and Recreation's vision to transform the youth and teen activity zone at Ebster Park, creating new recreational opportunities. The proposed updates include restroom facilities, improved accessibility through open ramps, enhanced lighting, and essential maintenance improvements. These upgrades will be driven by community input to create a more vibrant and inclusive park space for the entire community.




Decatur Rotary Club Hosts DeKalb County PAGE STAR Event
