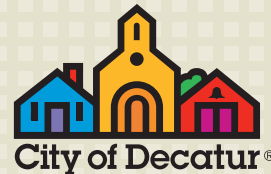

City of Decatur Celebrates Crossing Guards

On November 9, City of Decatur hosted a brunch, catered by culinary students from the Decatur High Career Academy, to celebrate our crossing guards in conjunction with Crossing Guard Appreciation Week, November 7-11. At the event, Active Living and Decatur Police presented each guard with a certificate and gift bag to demonstrate the City's gratitude to these important community helpers. Decatur crossing guards are a vital component of Decatur's Safe Routes to School program, protecting kids and citizens across our city whether rain, shine, heat or freezing temperatures.

The highlight of the event came when the Georgia Safe Routes to School Outreach Coordinator Marielena Gutiérrez announced that Decatur Crossing Guard Cindy Bryan had been selected as Crossing Guard of the Year for the Metro Atlanta Region.

Decatur employs 40 crossing guards; several have served the Decatur community for many years, including Nancy Copeland, Angela Gresham and Linda McGee (5 years), Gloria Rose (6 years), Sibyl Williams (10 years), Desiree Hall, Eula Malone & Tracy Washington (14 years), Earnestine Brooks (15 years), and Joyce Washington (17 years).

Out-of-Town House Check

Going out of town or leaving your house for a few days? Request an out-of-town house check and the Decatur Police Department will look in on your house while you are away. To sign up for this service fill out the Out of Town House Check form in the city's SeeClickFix system or call the police department at 404-373-6551.

To aid the department in its scheduling processes, do not enter your information any earlier than seven days prior to your departure. If by chance you change your mind and do not leave town, be sure to let them know that as well.

To complete this form online, visit decaturga.com/publicworks/page/see-click-fix. Scroll down and click on the Out of Town House Check Request tab. Enter your address in the search bar on the map, confirm location, then complete the form by answering the questions and hitting submit. Once done, you will receive an auto-generated confirmation email from the SeeClickFix system. You may also download the SeeClickFix smartphone app to make your request. Look for MyDecaturGA in your app store.

Three easy ways to request an out-of-town house check:

- Download the SeeClickFix app on your smart phone. Look for MyDecaturGA in your app store.
- Call the police non-emergency number, 404-373-6551.

Missing Middle Zoning Updates

While Missing Middle may be a new and unfamiliar term for some Decatur residents, the housing type that it represents is prevalent in Decatur's existing neighborhoods. From the outside, these multi-family structures are comparable or compatible in size to single-family homes yet they offer a place in our neighborhoods for middle income and workforce individuals and families who don't qualify for mortgages that start well above their pay range.

For many residents, single-family homes are impractical and/or unaffordable. City of Decatur's proposal to re-allow duplex, triplex, and quad housing types supports a more inclusive community. Decatur needs more housing that is tailored to accommodate different stages of life — recent graduates, young professionals, working couples building careers, growing families, or those divorced or retired.

The City of Decatur recently held two public hearings on October 11 and October 17 to present the proposed zoning to re-allow missing middle housing types in Decatur. Public input is an important step that informs the final zoning proposals. The City Commission also hosted a missing middle work session on December 5. Video recordings of the meetings and associated links can be accessed on the City of Decatur website at decaturga.com/affordablehousing.

Prior to the hearings, signs were placed throughout Decatur in compliance with state law. The City Commission will vote on the final recommended zoning proposals to re-allow duplex, triplex and quadplex construction and home conversions on January 17 and February 6, 2023.

RECYCLING TIPS FOR THE HOLIDAY SEASON

Follow these tips for a more sustainable holiday season:

- Drop Christmas trees at Legacy Park Dec. 26-Jan. 7 to be made into mulch for use in our city parks and greenspaces. Trees may also be placed at the curb for collection by the City's sanitation department, but these trees will be sent to the Dekalb County landfill and converted to mulch only as capacity allows.
- Wrapping paper – both regular and glossy – can be recycled at the curb unless it has non-paper additives like metallic flakes, foil, glitter, or plastic. Paper with these additives should be disposed of with your household trash. Please ensure all ribbons, bows, and other non-paper items are removed from wrapping paper before placing it in your commingled bin.

NEIGHBORHOOD CLEAN-UP SCHEDULE

The City of Decatur is wrapping up Neighborhood Cleanup Days this month for the streets listed below, to allow residents to dispose of bulky materials that would not normally be placed in pay-as-you-throw (PAYT) bags. INSTRUCTIONS All items to be collected should be placed at the curb no later than 7:30 a.m.

ACCEPTABLE ITEMS: yard trimmings, building materials (that are not from the work of private contractors), tires, furniture, appliances (not containing Freon), trash that would not normally be placed in PAYT bags

WE WILL NOT COLLECT: liquids, dirt, bricks, blocks, stone, rocks, or concrete, motor vehicle batteries or parts

They sort and manage tools, deliver food, rake leaves, drive trucks, haul trash and do whatever is needed to serve the families in 20-30 homes each year.

- Food captains assure that hundreds of volunteers are fed.
- Skilled craftspeople focus on more technical jobs.
- Laboring volunteers help make the whole project happen.

Winter Fire Facts from Decatur Fire

Each year, U.S. fire departments respond to thousands of home fires during the holiday season. While candles are the leading cause of home fires (45%), nearly 20 each day or 7,500 each year, Christmas trees, decorations, and holiday cooking all contribute to some staggering statistics. Some tips to avoid being a victim of holiday home fires include:

- **Christmas trees** – assure that the electrical distribution and/or lighting equipment is functioning properly, place your tree away from heat sources such as candles or heating equipment, keep your tree watered so needles don't dry out and become a fire hazard.
- **Holiday decorations** – set decorations away from open flames or heating equipment.
- **Candles** – don't place candles near flammable items such as furniture, mattresses or bedding, curtains, or decorations.
- **Cooking** – Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires, followed by Christmas Day and Christmas Eve. Do not leave decorations close to a stove or other cooking equipment.

When Strokes Strike, Don't Delay, Make the Call

When a Decatur resident suffered from a stroke earlier this year, the quick reaction of his wife saved his life. Sharing their experience is an important way to help others identify the signs and make the right decisions, quickly. A stroke victim will likely be unable to make proper decisions, so it's important to know how to help.

Recognize the warning signs. Initially her husband seemed to have dizziness and lack of balance. His symptoms quickly worsened — trouble speaking, problems with movement, weakness, numbness and paralysis on the left side of his body.

Call 911 immediately. Every second counts. Decatur EMS at Fire Station #1 responded within minutes. Once they reached the hospital emergency department, a swarm of doctors and nurses worked quickly to get him to surgery.

From the time of the stroke until surgery was complete was less than four hours. Had it not been for immediate medical intervention, the outcome could have been quite different. Due to these quick decisions, her husband was released from ICU about 55 hours after arriving at the hospital and has made a 100% recovery.

Anyone can experience a stroke, but several factors can put you at greater risk, including smoking, atrial fibrillation, hypertension, high cholesterol, lack of physical activity, previous history of stroke or TIA, old age, excessive alcohol consumption. Controlling these factors, diet changes, and an exercise program go a long way to preventing stroke. As always, consult your doctor before making changes. Questions? STROKE FYI FROM DECATUR FIRE

Strokes can be caused by blockages (ischemic) or bleeding (hemorrhagic); the symptoms can present differently but both require immediate treatment. A stroke can be likened to a heart attack of the brain, where compromised blood flow causes tissues to die. When blood is not reaching portions of the brain, the result is permanent damage. Seek immediate emergency medical care if you experience any of these warning signs.

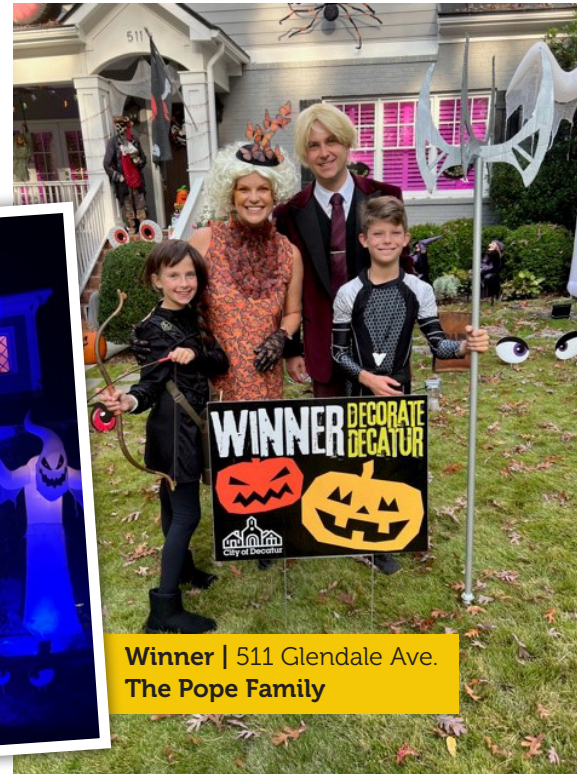
- Numbness or weakness on one side of the body or face.
- Speech alterations.
- Terrible headache, often accompanied by neck stiffness
- Trouble walking or loss of coordination.
- Altered mental status

The Beacon Hill Black Alliance for Human Rights is closing out 2022 with its final fundraising campaign to support Art for the People, a project of the Decolonize Decatur Committee. Your contribution will help commission an Indigenous artist's work that will serve as a response to the genocide cannon from the Creek Indian Wars of 1836 recently removed from Decatur Square. The previous project commissioned What Sonia Said, a sculpture created by Ellex Swavoni that resides in the Beacon Hill community as a response to the Lost Cause confederate monument removal. What Sonia Said was inspired by the poem "Catch the Fire" written by Sonia Sanchez.

*Where is your fire? I say where is your fire?
Can't you smell it coming out of our past?
The fire of living...not dying
The fire of loving...not killing
The fire of Blackness...not gangster shadows.
Where is our beautiful fire that gave light
to the world?
The fire of pyramids;
The fire that burned through the holes of
slavships and made us breathe;*

This excerpt undergirds the purpose of Art for the People to lift up the intersecting stories of people of Afrikan descent and the Indigenous in remembrance of their loss of life from genocide and forced enslavement along with land dispossession. Art for the People illustrates stories of resilience from both groups who continue to thrive and build communities in their respective places they call home today following their forced removal. Decatur Schools Celebrate Diwali – Festival of Lights

DHS Career Academy Partners with Emory for CNA Program

When Decatur High School Career Academy Director Duane Sprull learned that Emory School of Nursing was opening its new Emory Nursing Learning Center (ENLC) in downtown Decatur, he was excited to explore opportunities to develop a partnership program that would enable students at Decatur High to participate in a certified nursing assistant (CNA) program.

Of 1,800 Decatur High students, more than 1,100 participate in the Decatur Career Academy. For FY 2023, the DCA received more than \$100,000 in state and federal grants, which helps fund 1,364 spots (some students participate in multiple programs). The DCA offers 10 career pathways, the most popular being culinary arts, architecture, and graphic arts. Every track provides employability skills so participants can move directly into a career in their field of interest.

Developing the CNA program for DHS students was no small feat; Sprull needed a minimum of ten students to participate in the program. With only four Decatur High students committed, Sprull reached out to Drew Academy's respective career program and identified 10 additional participants to round out the enrollment at 14 students.

The first semester provides an introduction to healthcare through the Georgia Virtual Academy, completing three articulated credits at Georgia Piedmont Technical College. The semester rounds out with two classes; medical terminology and nutrition,



Emory School of Nursing Moves into Downtown Decatur

The Emory Nursing Learning Center is the latest resident at 250 E. Ponce de Leon Ave. Constructed in 1962, the eight-level office building has undergone a \$20.6 million renovation to four levels. The 70,000-SF ENLC features simulation and clinical skills labs that are among the largest and most advanced in Georgia.

which students complete online through the technical college. The second semester offers one class in nurse aid fundamentals, which includes 24 hours of hands-on clinical work in either a hospital or nursing home setting. Once completed, participating students will earn seven continuing education credits.

The new Emory facility provides an innovative workforce development partnership with CSD, and is an important addition to Decatur's downtown environment. The 70,000-SF ENLC facility features state-of-the-art simulation and professional development space, allowing participants to engage in interactive technology and experiential

learning that supports critical leadership skills and compassionate support for patients so graduates can become the next generation of nurse leaders.

Created to address the significant nursing shortage in the United States, the ENLC serves students of all levels, from undergraduates to continuing education students and advanced-practice nursing professionals. The program generates jobs by graduating three large classes of nurses and CNAs every year. This new partnership with Emory offers another career opportunity for Decatur students while supporting the nation's effort to sustain more jobs in the nursing field.

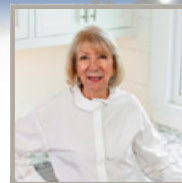

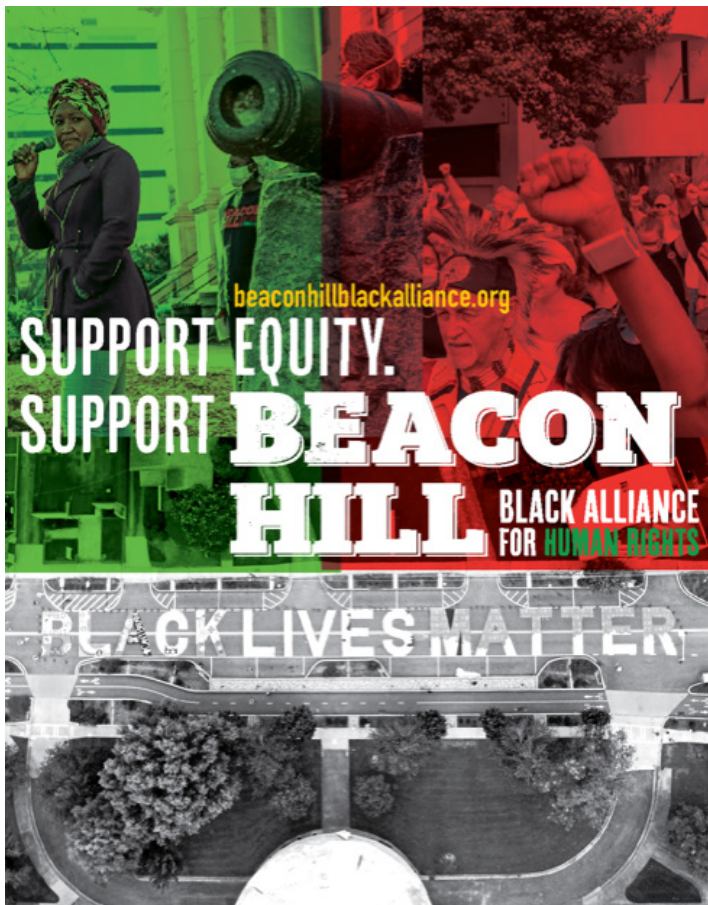
