2023 Welcoming Business Award Nominations Are Now Open

The Better Together Advisory Board is accepting nominations through October 13 for its annual Welcoming Business Award. Recipients will be announced by the City Commission in conjunction with the City of Decatur's Hometown Hero Awards in December. The award is open to all businesses in the city of Decatur that have employees and are located within the Decatur city limits. The purpose of this award is to:



- Reward and publicly recognize actions that create a welcoming and inclusive business environment in the City of Decatur;
- Encourage businesses to prioritize diversity, inclusivity, and equity as a "best practice"; and
- Publicize and share "best practices" among local businesses.

Award criteria include:

- Increasing accessibility for people with disabilities;
- Creating welcoming environments for people who are historically marginalized based on race, gender, class, ethnicity, sexual orientation, age;
- Recruiting and hiring practices that incorporate diversity, equity, and inclusion policies;
- Training staff to cultivate welcoming environments for all patrons;
- Anything else that creates a welcoming and inclusive environment.

The Better Together Advisory Board was initiated from the Better Together Community Action Plan for Equity, Inclusion, and Engagement. The advisory board created the Welcoming Business Award to highlight those businesses who make diversity, equity, and inclusion a priority.

Introducing the Decatur Parks and Recreation Department

n March, Recreatur, the Parks and Recreation 10year master plan was approved, and the City of Decatur's Parks and Recreation Department was dificially created. The Parks and Recreation Master Plan is a long-range, community-supported vision to move Decatur's parks and recreation efforts forward by expanding recreational facilities, protecting additional greenspaces, and considering community needs through varied programming. Recreatur recommended merging two divisions — Active Living and Children and Youth Services — under a single department. The Parks and Recreation Department will focus its energy on shaping programming and activities that support its mission to "provide quality experiences while promoting healthy living and connections." What does this mean for Decatur residents and visitors? Current services will continue uninterrupted over the next few months, and residents and visitors will begin to see a rebranding of the department. You may have already noticed the Active Living name now reflects Decatur Parks and Recreation. Children and Youth Services will fall under the Parks and Recreation umbrella and has changed to Out of School Time Services. Social media channels have merged: you can find Decatur Parks and Recreation on Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter (@decaturparksandrec). The webpage on the City's site can be found at decaturga. com/parksrec and will serve as a hub of information about the department and its programming. You may also visit any one of Decatur's three recreation centers to learn more. Front desk staff will be available at all three recreation centers from 9-6 p.m. Monday-Friday and 10-4 p.m. on Saturdays, or look for the Parks and Recreation staff at festivals and events around town.

WALK & ROLL SUPERSTARS

On August 1, many Decatur students will walk, bike, and scoot to school. As a motorist, be vigilant and keep your eyes peeled for school children as you navigate city streets.

Students benefit physically, socially and academically from an active commute creating an automatic time for physical movement and making exercise a part of their daily routine. In addition, students build relationships and emotional bonds with friends and older students experience independence and personal growth as they navigate the natural world and improve road and traffic safety skills. Studies show that physical activity contributes to student success in the classroom.

Students actively commuting benefits the greater community with fewer cars on the road, leading to less traffic congestion. Staying Safe While Grilling

July and August are peak months for grill fires. Nearly 65 percent of households have a grill or smoker, and on average fire departments respond to more than 10,000 home fires each year involving grills, hibachis or barbecues.

Decatur Fire wants to keep the community safe by reminding us to follow rules and codes for grilling and using fire pits. The use of grills on combustible balconies and patios of multi-family dwellings is prohibited. There are some exceptions for some townhomes/condominiums; contact your homeowner's association and building supervisor for specific rules.

- The City of Decatur's ordinance for open burning is as follows:
- No open burning of leaves, rubbish or trash of any kind.
- No heavy smoke producing materials such as heavy oils, asphaltic materials, natural or synthetic rubber.
- Recreational fires must be in commercially available chimineas or outdoor fireplaces and used according to their intended use, and the manufacturer's recommendations. They shall have a chimney, screen, or other approved method to prevent sparks escaping.
- Only burn untreated wood, lumber, manufactured fire logs, or charcoal in Chimineas or outdoor fireplaces.
- Chimineas or outdoor fireplaces shall not be operated inside structures, on combustible surfaces or balconies, or within 25 feet of combustible construction; and they shall have a non-combustible surface underneath to catch sparks.

Decatur Fire Launches Field Referral Program

In 2020, DeKalb County launched its innovative Nurse Navigation Program in partnership with American Medical Response, helping thousands of 911 callers access appropriate levels of care, right when they need it. Now, a field-referral process with Decatur Fire Rescue will extend the reach of that program, connecting more patients to skilled nurse navigators, while freeing vital EMS resources.

Decatur Fire Rescue first responders will assess patients and determine if they are eligible for the Nurse Navigation Program. If they are



eligible, Decatur Fire Rescue first responders will connect the patient to a Nurse Navigator who will match the patient with appropriate care, including an alternative destination site, nurse advice for care onsite or a visit with their primary care provider.

Through this program, the City of Decatur is better equipped to allocate resources and focus on providing timely, appropriate and high-quality patient care aimed at improving each patient's experience and outcomes. For more information, contact Deputy Chief Vera Morrison at 678-553-6580.

Help Keep Decatur Fire Hydrants Clear

Every year Decatur Fire inspects, tests, and maintains more than 900 hydrants throughout Decatur. If you have a hydrant in your yard, please remember that there must be three feet of clearance on all sides. Bushes, plants, and trees must be trimmed to allow firefighters to easily open the hydrant and attach supply lines to any outlets in the event of an emergency.

Be Prepared for Heat Emergencies

During the summer, it's important to watch out for dehydration and other heat-related emergencies. Drink a glass of water every few hours throughout the day based on your sweating, activity, and temperatures.

If you experience heat cramps, which can be accompanied by headaches and sweating, stop your activity, get out of the sun, and place cool cloths or ice wrapped in towels on the areas cramping. Be vigilant for worsening symptoms. If you're experiencing heat exhaustion, you might have the above symptoms, plus dizziness and vomiting. Anyone experiencing these symptoms should immediately get out of the sun, lay down, remove as much clothing as possible, and cool their body with water or damp cloths on the neck, armpits, and groin.

Lastly, heat stroke is a very serious condition that can be life threatening. With heat stroke, sweating may no longer occur, and there may be confusion or a loss of consciousness or seizures. This person must be cooled immediately with no delay after being removed from the sun. Call 911 as soon as possible and be prepared to locate an AED and start CPR if necessary.

When in doubt, call 911 any time you are concerned.

Summer Water Safety Tips

Did you know drowning is the number one cause of preventable death for children aged one to four? The American Heart Association recommends five things to avoid a tragedy: foursided fencing around water; life jackets; swimming lessons; supervision; and lifeguards.

It's important to ensure life jackets are worn properly or they may not be effective. Swimming lessons are recommended for children aged one or older, and awareness of how to respond to smaller children struggling in the water is recommended for older children. Constant supervision is the most crucial thing to remember, since it only takes a moment of inattention for a child to drown.

If a child isn't breathing, call 911 and begin compressions immediately.

City Named All-America City for 2023

The National Civic League has once again named City of Decatur one of 10 All-America Cities at its annual meeting held in June. Decatur showed the power of involving youth, and all residents, in identifying and addressing community challenges.

Applicants submitted their communitywide work on engaging youth to create more thriving communities, and the field was narrowed to 20. Finalist communities presented their projects and their communities to a jury. Decatur's presentation focused on the Decatur Youth Council, participation in UNICEF's Child Friendly Cities Initiative, the recently installed Inclusive Playground at Decatur Legacy Park, and other youthinspired initiatives.

Decatur first received recognition as an All-America City in 2018 for its equity and inclusion efforts through the creation of the Better Together Community Action Plan; the Police department's intentional focus on community engagement and training; and the I Am Decatur project coordinated by Beate Sass.

The program's small class sizes and cohort model inculcate a close-knit community where they are seen and heard as the whole person. According to the Faculty Program Director Jennifer Fulling-Smith, PhD, LPC, RPT-S, "Agnes Scott's community empowers Clinical Mental Health Counseling students to think critically about mental health and barriers to mental health. We approach core areas of counseling with intersectional frameworks so that graduates will enter the field not only as well trained, skilled counselors, but also counselors who can truly engage in the social challenges clients face due to the oppression they experience. Our program prepares its graduates to make a lasting impact in the community."

Agnes Scott College's innovative Master's in Clinical Mental

Health Counseling offers a clear path to preparing students for licensure. For recent college graduates or working professionals looking to make a career change, this 18-month master's program is a great career step. After five consecutive semesters of primarily in-person instruction, students will be well-prepared to sit for the licensure exam required to apply to become a licensed professional counselor.




Talley Street Elementary Hosts First Amazing Shake

This year at Talley Street Upper Elementary School, teachers, staff, and students kicked off their new "house" system modeled after the program at the Ron Clark Academy in Atlanta. The house program helps to make Talley, a school of 700 students, seem smaller as students participate in activities throughout the year in their house groups including house meetings, community service projects, and social events.

At the beginning of the school year, students were sorted into one of six houses: Altruismo (the house of givers), Amistad (the house of friendship), Isibindi (the house of courage), Rêveur (the house of dreamers), Onarka (the house of unity), and Nukumori (the house of kindness).
