- JUNE 20: public hearing and scheduled adoption of proposed FY 2023-2024 budget and revised 2022-2023 budget and 2023 millage rates.

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Decatur Welcomes Women's Transportation Seminar

The Women's Transportation Seminar (WTS) Atlanta Chapter hosted the WTS International Conference in May. The Conference theme was "The Great Intersection: Transportation and Equity." Attendees traveled by MARTA and by electric shuttles provided by Let's Ride Atlanta to learn about Decatur's implementation of new bicycle and

pedestrian facilities that make Decatur a Silver Level Bicycle Friendly Community and Gold Walk Friendly Community. The participants also learned of the City of Decatur's 2030 Strategic Plan goals on equity and racial justice, climate action, civic trust, affordable housing, mobility and economic growth.

Decatur Legislators Pass Property Tax Relief Proposals

Last month, the Decatur City Commission announced that come November, voters will have the opportunity to decide on proposed homestead exemptions that give property tax relief to persons who own their homes and are impacted by increasing property values.

The package of property tax relief bills was co-sponsored in the House by Decatur's legislative delegation - Representatives Omari Crawford, Karla Drenner, Becky Evans and Mary Margaret Oliver, and by Senator Elena Parent in the Senate. Governor Brian Kemp signed the measures into law.

The details of the General Homestead

Exemptions, if adopted by the voters, would result in the following:

- HOUSE BILL 632 increases the General Homestead Exemption (GH-1) for all residential owner-occupied properties from \$25,000 to \$40,000; and,
- HOUSE BILL 633 increases the General Homestead Exemption (GH-2) for residential owner-occupied properties for persons 65 years of age or older from \$10,000 to \$15,000; and,
- HOUSE BILL 635 increases the General Homestead Exemption (GH-3) for

residential owner-occupied properties for persons 62 years of age of older whose Georgia net taxable household income does not exceed \$50,000 from \$15,000 to \$25,000 and adjust the household income limit from \$50,000 to \$60,000.

In addition, House Bill 634 also passed, allowing a referendum to ensure that resident property owners on Decatur Land Trust properties are afforded a homestead exemption similar to the City's general homestead exemption.

Decatur Fire Participates in Live Fire Training

A few times each year, Decatur Fire visits the DeKalb County Fire training center to use their burn building to train in a live fire environment. Because no one is losing life or property at these trainings, it's a good opportunity to capture action photos of how firefighters react to a structure fire incident.

Many may think that fighting fire means "putting wet stuff on hot stuff," but the reality is far more complex. Firefighters must be trained on the latest studies in fire behavior, flow paths, and best practices in strategies and tactics to operate safely and efficiently.

These trainings include a search and rescue scenario, an attack on a fire above grade (upstairs), at grade (ground floor), and below grade (typically basement — these can be the most dangerous as heat rises and flows up a staircase like a chimney as firefighters descend).

This training gives newer firefighters a better understanding of how thermal imaging cameras are utilized during a structure fire, and provides them with a great example of how thermal layering (the space where the superheated gases are located above the cooler lower layer) works, and how to ensure they stay below that level whenever possible.

These realistic scenarios help firefighters practice their skills in a (mostly) controlled environment where certified Live-Fire Instructors can observe. evaluate, provide constructive feedback, and stop any unsafe acts. Temperatures can reach up to 1000 degrees in the upper levels during these trainings, so safety is always the first consideration.







Help Prevent Brush Fire This Summer

While Decatur doesn't experience wildfires as often as places out West, more frequent temperature extremes across the country have resulted in more frequent wildfires. Decatur Firefighter David Jimenez has fought wildfires, and offers the following tips to avoid brush fires in our area

- Don't leave clear glass or plastic containers on your porch or in your yard - these containers can act as a magnifying glass and concentrate the rays of the sun, igniting dry materials (we've seen this happen in Decatur).
- Remove dried vegetation - rake and compost dead plants; they can become an excellent fuel source for sparks or concentrated sun rays.



- If you have a burn pit, use a screen cover to contain sparks, keep a water hose nearby, and never leave fire unattended. When finished, extinguish fire thoroughly to ensure there are no hot embers remaining.
- If you spot a brush fire, call 911 before attempting to extinguish - no matter the size of the fire; brush fires can spread extremely quickly (particularly if it's windy and dry) and you may find that a small fire can grow exponentially faster than anticipated.
- Don't extinguish a brush fire by stomping it out your clothing may ignite and you could risk a serious burn injury. If there's no water hose or extinguisher available, wait for fire personnel to arrive.
- Don't leave lithium ion batteries on a charger or in direct sunlight - when charging power tools, lawnmowers, or scooters outside, make sure they are not in direct sunlight where they can easily overheat, and take them off the charger as soon as they are charged.



Planning for the Legacy Park Track and Field

he City of Decatur and City Schools of Decatur welcome all interested community members to learn more about the proposed track and field at Legacy Park. Planned improvements include a new competition track and field facility, synthetic turf athletic field, lighting, field house or comparable improvements to the existing gym, and storm water management.

Breedlove Land Planning of Atlanta will

lead the planning and design effort for the project, which was identified as a community priority in the 2018 Legacy Park master plan (decaturnext.com/trackandfield). Breedlove is a landscape planning and engineering firm, recognized for its expertise in design of parks and recreation facilities, scholastic site and athletic field improvements, and storm water management.

Funding for the track and field will be provided jointly by the City of Decatur and the

City Schools of Decatur Board of Education. Barring unforeseen conditions, the project should be ready for construction by the end of 2023. Previous opportunities to meet the planning team and share ideas for the project were held on April 18 and May 16 at Legacy Park. Decatur Experiencing Increased Graffiti

Decatur is experiencing a challenge with an increase in graffiti on many commercial buildings, signage, and most recently, on murals.

Decatur is known for an abundance of art and art initiatives, including art commissioned for traffic boxes, murals, and other initiatives that are designed to showcase both the art and artists. However, graffiti and/ or "tagging" is vandalism to buildings, city signage, property, and murals. The cost of removing graffiti is shouldered by property owners, small business owners, and the City.

The City is working with the Decatur Arts Alliance on an idea for a designated space appropriate for free-spirited art. Until then the community must continue to work together to stop graffiti on commercial buildings, signage, city property and other artwork around the city.

If you witness someone tagging or placing graffiti or if your business has been tagged, please contact police to file a report.

If you see graffiti, please email the location along with a photograph to the City's codes enforcement officer, Cynthia Hardnett at Cynthia.hardnett@decaturga.com.

The City's code of ordinances prohibits graffiti under Sec. 70-29.

a) Graffiti is defined according to O.C.G.A. § 17-15A-2 as "any inscriptions, words, figures, paintings, or other defacements that



are written, marked, etched, scratched, sprayed, drawn, painted or engraved on or otherwise affixed to any surface of real property or improvements thereon without prior authorization of the owner or occupant of the property by means of any aerosol paint container, broad-tipped marker, gum label, paint stick, graffiti stick, etching equipment, brush or other device capable of scarring or leaving a visible mark on any surface."

b) It shall be unlawful for any person within

the corporate limits of the city to commit the offense of application of graffiti.

c) In determining the appropriate punishment under Code section 1-12, the municipal court may suspend a portion of or the entire sentence upon such conditions to include but not be limited to the restoring of the property so defaced, damaged or destroyed, or other remedial action.



Decatur is FOR the Birds!

ecatur is a good place to be a bird. Walk down any street and vou will find birdfeeders and birdhouses in front or back yards, and many people are adding native plants that support and nurture birds. With such a vibrant bird population, it's not uncommon to find a bird in potential distress.

Wild Nest Bird Rehab cares for birds with broken necks, wings, or legs. Birds become patients for multiple reasons. Some birds mistake a window for wide open sky and end up harmed by a window strike. Others become victims to free-roaming cats or dogs that instinctively pounce. Many birds get caught in sticky bug traps and harm themselves trying to get free.

At Wild Nest, most injured birds are accepted immediately. The rehab specialists


administer antibiotics and other medications as needed, and volunteers hand feed birds or make sure they have enough avian salad, seed, or mealworms to feed themselves. While Wild Nest is licensed to handle songbirds only, volunteers and the website can help locate rehab specialists for raptors (such as hawks), water birds, and other birdlife.

Last year, Wild Nest took in more than 1,500 birds from the metro Atlanta area. The cottage at Legacy Park provides the space to care for birds at all life stages—from infants to juveniles to adults. Facility Manager Dave Butler spearheaded the effort to construct an outdoor aviary adjacent to the cottage, where birds nearly ready for release spend time experiencing the outdoor air and testing their wings in a space larger than a cage allows.

Wild Nest is a vital contributor to wildlife

conservation. The organization strives to return every possible bird to the wild. The group's founder and Decatur resident Nancy Eilen explains that many birds are returned to the area where they were found, but some bluebirds and finches at Legacy Park were once patients.

The organization enjoys sharing their work with the community but as a federallylicensed rehabilitator, visitors are not allowed. However anyone age eighteen or older can volunteer, and during baby season, they need all hands. Volunteers help with bird care, data entry and administrative jobs, as well as marketing and fundraising. For more information or to make a donation, visit wildnestbirdrehab.org.



If you encounter a bird in possible distress, it's important to know what steps to take.

Sometimes a baby bird can be put back in its nest, and other times, patience and distance give a parent the time and space it needs to return to the nest to feed its young. The Wild Nest website provides a helpful protocol to figure out what's best for the bird. If uncertain, please call: no bird should be offered food or water until it's fully assessed.



Wild Nest Bird Rehab at Decatur's Legacy Park offers expert help and a temporary home for injured or orphaned wild birds.


New Plantings Enhance Decatur Cemetery


DECATUR ARCHITECTURE WALKING TOUR



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
