Audible Pedestrian Signals Coming to 5 Decatur Intersections

Audible pedestrian signals are being installed at five intersections in downtown Decatur to help make the city more accessible for community members with visual impairments. Users simply press the crossing button and a voice recording will announce the pedestrian walk signal. The audible pedestrian signals can be found at:

- 1. Commerce Dr. at North Candler St.
- 2. Commerce Dr. at East Ponce de Leon Ave.
- 3. Commerce Dr. at Sycamore St.
- 4. East Ponce de Leon Ave. at North Candler St.
- 5. Church St. at Sycamore St.

Georgia Department of Transportation's Office of Traffic Operations provided the signal equipment through its safety program, the City of Decatur is overseeing their installation, and DeKalb County Traffic Engineering is responsible for their operation and maintenance.

Shirley Baylis Steps Down as Business Development Manager


Longtime Business Development Manager Shirley Baylis has stepped down from her role to join the Community Redevelopment Authority with the City of Pensacola, Florida. Shirley worked with Decatur since December 2009 and played an instrumental role in several initiatives across the city.

She wrote and managed the employee wellness program while serving as the payroll and benefits coordinator. As special events coordinator, Shirley was a part of the steering team to bring the city's first Tiny House Festival, which brought approximately 8,000 people to the city over that weekend. As business development manager, she wrote, lead, and managed projects like the Decatur Retail Incubator Program (DRIP), the Commercial Façade Improvement Grant program, managed the Commercial Buildout program, and Marketing, Digital and Connectivity Grant program, and managed the pilot shuttle program in 2023. 
- Increasing accessibility for people with disabilities;

FOR THE TREES ... AND LEGACY PARK

very day is a reason to celebrate Decatur and the community we all call home. This year, we are celebrating our 2024 Georgia Arborist of the year, Kay Evanovich and just this month, the city was honored by Trees Atlanta as the Tree Champion Community Partner for 2024.

Trees have always held a special place for me and have been part of the leafy landscape that shaped my life. I grew up in the Piney Woods of East Texas and following college, moved to the lush green valley of Chattanooga, with its winding river and stately trees. The first home my husband, Gary, and I purchased was in an aptly named neighborhood, Cherokee Woods. And one of the first places we came upon when walking through a very unfamiliar Decatur, visiting from Chattanooga in 2000, was the Oakhurst Community Garden, now a part of the Wylde Center.



We served on the Board of the Oakhurst Community Garden and volunteered for Trees Atlanta, planting trees in and around Decatur. I remember gathering to celebrate the Oakhurst Arboretum; the Arboretum marker can be found at the corner of Oakview Road and East Lake Dr., in front of Oakview Coffee.

Trees Atlanta continues to plant street trees and front yard trees in its Front Yard tree program in Decatur. Over 450 native trees and shrubs have been planted by Trees Atlanta and volunteers in this year's Fall/Winter season. Tree plantings, in addition to the removal of ivy and other invasives, have made Legacy Park even more inviting. In presenting the 2024 Community Tree Champion award, Trees Atlanta provided the following:

The City of Decatur is one of our longest running and most dedicated community partners. Our long-time partnership and your continued dedication to protecting and enhancing Decatur's tree canopy leads Trees Atlanta to recognize the City of Decatur as our 2024 Community Tree Champion, recognizing the strong desire to support urban trees through planting, tree care, greenspace restoration and consistent investment. The City's leadership team supports those activities and actively promotes the benefits trees provide to the Decatur community. Our ongoing work to restore Legacy Park and make it more accessible to residents is one shining example of the investments you are making.

I invite you to visit Legacy and see the unfolding of the Master Plan in progress, with preservation of greenspace, care of the existing trees, and plantings to ensure trees and shade in the future. The construction of the new track and field facility, with City Schools of Decatur as our partner in this endeavor is underway; this facility will bring more opportunities for active uses on the property. Visit the inclusive playground; note the wonderful nonprofits that also serve our community; walk the Cross Country trail; see the Dairy Barn; listen for the birds; visit the pond; find the fruit trees planted by the Decatur Youth Council; enjoy Truckin' Tuesdays on the lawn on Tuesday evenings in May. We will also soon be welcoming new neighbors into the community with the construction of phase one of the Village at Legacy.

Lifelong Community **Advisory Board Celebrates** Older Americans Month

The City of Decatur and the Decatur Lifelong Community Advisory Board are celebrating Older Americans Month in May. This year the Board has worked on several initiatives to further its goal of assisting the City in recommending, implementing, and supporting programs for senior citizens.

Decatur is recognized as an AARP Age-Friendly Community. The Age-Friendly initiative was created to prepare communities for the aging of the nation's population by focusing on and strengthening the features and services that help to make communities livable for all ages, from cradle to retirement. As part of the designation, the board created and the City has formally adopted a five-year Age-Friendly Community Action Plan. The plan was created with general guidelines from AARP and the World Health Organization.

The Age-Friendly Community Action Plan outlines a fiveyear effort to ensure that older Decatur residents are connected, healthy, and engaged in the community. The plan addresses challenges identified by residents and describes goals that are achievable within five years. The plan builds on previous plans created in Decatur and adds an emphasis on older residents.

There are nine areas or "domains" where goals are set and achieved: Outdoor Spaces and Buildings, Transportation, Housing, Social Participation, Respect and Social Inclusion, Civic Engagement and Participation, Communication and Information, Community and Health Services, and Business Services. Within each domain are specific goals for the City or the board to achieve.

In connection with action items in the plan for 2023-24, the board has been active with the Spotlight on Dementia Foundation and has offered training for residents and others in interacting with dementia patients and their caregivers, with the goal of ultimately increasing awareness and involvement of the business community. Bicentennial blankets to enjoy the fireworks at the outdoor celebration of Decatur's 200th anniversary in December were provided as part of the plan's goal to help encourage older adults to stay active and be able to attend special events comfortably. The Lifelong Community Advisory Board is working with Decatur Fire to learn about Smart911 and how it can assist older residents with emergency preparedness. The board has also started contributing articles to the Focus newsletter to further its goals in its Communication and Information domain.

The Lifelong Community Advisory Board members are Susan Messing, Tim Hatten, GG Howard, Sandy Bailey, Stephanie Roach, Rev. Marti Keller, Melinda Mobley, and Arlene Schler. The City's staff liaison to the Board is Julie Smith, lifelong community manager. They meet on the fourth Monday of every month in City Hall and meetings are open to the public. Meet the Decatur Environmental Sustainability Board

The Environmental Sustainability Board (ESB) recently appointed several new members including a new chair and two youth members. Eight of the 11 members on the ESB are new.

Alex Stewart is the new chair of the ESB and moved to Decatur in 2021 with his wife Courtney. They now have a one-yearold daughter, Monroe. His background is in construction project management and construction technology. Alex joins Annie Archbold who serves as the co-chair. Annie is retired from the CDC, a Master Gardener, and a longtime resident of the city who was part of the team that assisted with updating Decatur's tree ordinance. Juno Rogers and Payton Sobon are the new youth members of the board. Juno is a senior at Decatur High School and she says that her environmental consciousness is rooted in her love for the outdoors where she attended the Outdoor Academy, completed an internship with the Decatur Farm to School Program/ The Wylde Center. Payton leads the Decatur High School Student Government Association's sustainability task force and has organized initiatives such as Earth Day 5k and a Decatur toy drive.

Kristy Bible started her career financing renewable energy projects and currently serves as the event manager and Oakhurst Garden site coordinator for the Wylde Center. In addition, she is engaged in building and maintaining gardens at Decatur schools.

Cynthia Curry is passionate about sustainability and builds the cleantech ecosystem through her work at Metro Atlanta Chamber. The Oakhurst resident has lived in Decatur for more than 30 years with her son, husband, and two rescue dogs and serves on numerous boards in the region.

Tony Harding is an assistant professor in Georgia Tech's School of Public Policy focusing on environmental economics. He is new to the community, and he wants to

focus on enhancing the city's environmental footprint during his term.

Jane Lomas is an educator and a realtor, specializing in serving seniors and their families through life transitions and believes in creating a sustainable world that will benefit future generations.

Hunter Unrue is an experienced investment manager who moved to Decatur with his wife Kendal and their new daughter Daphne. He wants to work toward the success of Decatur's environmental goals including composting, waste management and walkability throughout the city.

Board members Mike Barcik and An**drew Harden** are veterans of the ESB. Mike is a technical principal at Southface Institute and helps lead weatherization efforts with Decatur's MLK Service Project. He also co-wrote Decatur's High Performance Building Ordinance, and is working to help implement Decatur's Clean Energy Plan. Andrew's interests lie in the transition to clean energy, waste management and composting,

and smart cities. He has partnered with City Schools of Decatur on several grant applications to secure funding for energy retrofits throughout CSD. In his professional life, Andrew is a change management expert, focusing on the human factors of change adoption.

The ESB was established to provide recommendations to the City Commission regarding the city's environmental regulations, plans, and initiatives as well as assisting with implementation of city projects that impact the natural environment to protect and improve the quality of life for citizens and property owners in the City of Decatur. The board assumed the duties of the Waste Management Advisory Board and the Greenspace Commission. It also fulfills the requirements for a Stormwater Management Advisory Board. The ESB meets on the fourth Monday of each month 4-6 p.m. at the Decatur Recreation Center and meetings are open to the public. Learn more at decaturga.com/bc-esb.

City Budget Process: Dates to Remember

Decatur's fiscal year 2024-2025 budget process is underway. If you want to get involved in the process, participate on these important dates (subject to City Commission approval):

- May 20: Formal presentation of the budget to the City Commission and adoption of tentative 2024 millage rates.
- June 3: Public hearing on proposed FY 2024-2025 budget and revised 2023-2024 budget and 2024 millage rates.
- **June 5:** Extended work session on proposed FY 2024-2025 budget and revised 2023-2024 budget (alternate date).
- June 10: Public hearing on proposed FY 2024-2025 budget and revised 2023-2024 budget and 2024 millage rates (if needed).
- **June 17:** Public hearing and scheduled adoption of proposed FY 2024-2025 budget and revised 2023-2024 budget and 2024 millage rates.

All public hearings on the budget will be held in-person and via Zoom. Access information and meeting times will be published on the City's website at decaturga.com/budget. Copies of the FY 2024-2025 budget and revised 2023-2024 budget will be posted online beginning Wednesday, May 19. Hard copies will be available at Decatur City Hall, 509 N. FINANCIAL SUSTAINABILITY STRATEGY


The financial sustainability strategy model developed with input from city commissioners, members of the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, and staff members, is a critical tool in the Parks and Recreation Department's efforts to strengthen their financial future. The model identifies both the level of subsidy (portion of an activity's costs to be offset by the City's budget) and the level of cost recovery (portion of an activity's costs to be offset by the beneficiary or participating community members) by service category (activities or services with similar purpose). This continuum will serve as a guide for the Parks and Recreation Department for the next two to three years in designing future programming and in setting fees aligned with the subsidy and cost recovery targets based on service category.

Insights

- The City of Decatur parks and recreation system is facility-rich and, therefore, expensive. They have more recreation centers, pools, and other facilities, such as a full-service tennis center, than other communities of a similar size (both in terms of population and square mileage).
- A detailed financial analysis by 110%, Inc. did not identify areas of excess or inefficiency in the Parks and Recreation budget. The consultants determined that the department needs staff to operate the City's many facilities - and personnel and facility costs make up a majority of the department's operating budget.
- In the upcoming fiscal year, the department's 58% cost recovery goal is very competitive when compared against the national average of 24.6% for public parks and recreation agencies (source: 2023 NRPA Agency Performance Review Report).

Recommendations

Avoid fee increases for FY24-25 - Focus on improving cost recovery goals by implementing a variety of strategies (increase program



participation, create a sponsorship program, implement operational efficiencies, consider increasing specific service category fees over a two- to three-year period).

- Formalize agreements with partners such as Agnes Scott College and City Schools of Decatur.
- Prioritize filling facilities with people and programs and maximize use of multi-functional spaces. Do this through creative marketing strategies including direct marketing to target audiences.
- Use strategies such as a facility utilization study (identify facility utilization gaps in order to determine marketing targets) and a partner inventory (gather information on all local leisure services providers and their programming to avoid duplication and explore potential partnerships).
- Conduct another financial sustainability analysis in FY25-26 to evaluate progress.
