Greet Amal and welcome her to Decatur as she visits and spreads her story. Little Amal is a 12-foot puppet of a 10-year-old Syrian refugee girl, spreading her story of hope as she discovers the beating heart of America, its blended culture and diverse people. Little Amal arrives in Atlanta on Oct. 8 and will visit Decatur on Oct. 10 as part of her epic 6,000-mile journey across the United States. There will be special activities, music and food on the square.

Her two-month trek visiting more than 35 U.S. cities and towns for 100+ events started in Boston on September 7 and will end on November 5 in San Diego. Amal Walks Across America is produced by the Walk Productions in association with Handspring Puppet Company, which also guided Amal's initial 5,000-mile walk across Europe in 2021 and through all five boroughs of New York City in 2022.

Metro Atlanta Cities Wellbeing Initiative

n August, representatives from Decatur Parks and Recreation, Decatur Fire, and Clarity Fitness, along with Mayor Patti Garrett joined other Metro-Atlanta Cities Wellbeing Initiative participants to present final plans to improve health outcomes for residents in their communities. Decatur was one of five cities awarded \$4,500 from the Atlanta Regional Collaborative for Health Improvement (ARCHI) as seed money to implement their plans. The Metro-Atlanta Cities Wellbeing Initiative was developed in partnership with ARCHI,

the Georgia Municipal Association, and its non-profit, Georgia City Solutions, and the National League of Cities, with financial support from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. The 8-month course brought together city officials, staff, and community leaders to improve the quality of life in their communities through greater understanding of local well-being metrics, stewardship, social determinants of health, equity, and systems. With the support of University of Georgia Health Equity Fellows and regional experts, these leaders developed action plans by translating data and insights into tangible policy action to improve community wellbeing.

Decatur plans to promote physical activity among adults, especially older adults, by identi-

fying physical health activity needs and barriers to access, and incorporating weight inclusivity into new or existing programs.

Floodplain Information Available

COOKING SAFETY STARTS WITH YOU

Pay attention to fire prevention

According to the National Fire Protection Association, cooking caused an average of 172,900 reported home structure fires per year, 49 percent of all reported home fires in the U.S. These fires resulted in an average of 550 civilian deaths (21 percent of all home fire deaths) and 4,820 civilian injuries (44 percent of all reported home fire injuries) annually.

What can you do to help avoid cooking fires?

- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short time, turn off the stove. Conversations and distractions can last longer than you think, allowing a fire to occur in your absence.
- Stay alert. It's easy to fall asleep if you watch TV while your food is cooking, especially at night or if you are on medications that cause drowsiness.



Keep anything

that can catch fire — oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop, even if it is not on.

- Tightly roll sleeves or wear close-fitting clothing when cooking. Loose clothing can catch fire when reaching over burners.
- Keep handles turned inward, (but not over another hot burner) to prevent pans from being accidentally knocked off and cause serious burns.
- Keep an extinguisher near the kitchen, but not in a place where you'd have to reach past a fire to get it. Make sure that it's charged and not expired.
- Place a lid over small fires to extinguish the flames instead, if possible. Never put water on a grease or oil fire.
- Have a "kid- and pet-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) around the stove or grill and anywhere else hot food or drink is prepared or carried.
- Make sure you have working smoke alarms in the house, but not directly in the kitchen where you might be tempted to remove the battery from too many alarms due to burnt food.
- Improper microwave use can also result in fires, and steam from sealed microwave food bags can cause serious burns. Don't allow children to use the microwave or open bags of hot food.

Meet **Tonio Andrade**, this month's Walk & Roll Superstar. Tonio is an Emory history professor who has commuted to work by bicycle for 15 years. He lives in Winnona Park with his wife Andrea and daughters Amalia, Sylvia, and Josephine.

Tonio's daily bike adventures began after hearing that each mile driven in a car emits about a pound of carbon dioxide into the air. After some quick mental calculations, he realized biking to work could make a considerable difference. He decided to give it a try and has never looked back.


While Tonio initially considered environmental reasons for commuting via bike, he quickly became aware of the myriad of other benefits. First and foremost, he feels "absolutely fantastic." He arrives at the office with a clear head, fully ready to work, write, and plan. He's fit and healthy, loves breathing in the morning air, and certainly does not miss the frustrations of car commuting and sitting in traffic.

Tonio actively advocates for safer streets, and is co-founder of two organizations. The Decatur Bicycle Coalition seeks to create infrastructure safe for people on bikes or in wheelchairs, with a goal of building a network of protected paths complete and connected enough that people of all ages can use them without fear of harm from automobiles. Calm Candler focuses on one of the city's most dangerous roadways, and works to lower traffic speeds and provide safer crossings for the hundreds of people—including students—who walk along or across South Candler Street. Tonio appreciates the city's cooperation, and Candler Street has become safer, although the basic problem remains: motorists drive too fast and frequently run stoplights.

PERMITTING 101

Residents can find permitting information at decaturga.com/dec. For questions, including inquiries about right of way permits or stop work orders, call 404-377-6198.

WHEN IS A PERMIT NEEDED?

- Constructing, enlarging, altering, repairing, moving, demolishing, or changing the occupancy of any structure
- Repairs, maintenance, or construction valued equal or greater than \$1,000
- Any roofing or structural work
- Trade permits are required when installing, enlarging, altering, repairing, removing, converting, or replacing any drainage, sewer, natural gas, mechanical (HVAC), electrical, or plumbing system (regardless of value)
- Any changes that impact zoning (such as changes in lot coverage) and any land disturbing activities
- Work within a Local Historic District
- Work or activities that block, impede, or otherwise affect sidewalks, streets, or other rights-of-way

WHY SHOULD I PULL A PERMIT?

The permitting process ensures work is done to code. These codes are in place to protect the environment and the health, safety, and welfare of our community.

THE PERMITTING PROCESS

Depending on size and scope, a pre-application meeting may be necessary

- **1**. An application is submitted
- 2. The application is accepted and processed
- **3**. Construction documents and other supporting files are uploaded
- 4. Staff reviews documents for compliance (revisions may be necessary)
- 5. A building permit is issued
- **6**. As work takes place, compliance inspections are done
- **7.** Once work is complete, final inspections are completed
- 8. A Certificate of Occupancy or Certificate of Completion is issued and the permit is closed out. A Certificate of Occupancy ensures a newly constructed or significantly renovated structure is safe to occupy. A Certificate of Completion signifies less extensive work has been completed per code.

Certificate of Occupancy : new structures, additions, or major renovations
Certificate of Completion: smaller renovations, driveway/roof replacements

ePERMITTING

To improve efficiency and reduce waste, the City of Decatur uses an electronic permitting platform. All applications, reviews, and inspections are handled digitally.

THE GOOD, THE BAD AND THE UGLY

When permits are secured, the work has been verified to be code compliant. Benefits include:

- Licensed/qualified contractors perform work
- Work has been reviewed to ensure compliance to codes
- Property value is maintained (or increased)
- Environmental impacts are mitigated

When permits are NOT secured, work has NOT been reviewed for code compliance. Potential outcomes include:

- Structurally unsound work
- Dangerous living conditions (no emergency egress)
- Environmental hazards (electrical, natural gas, fire)
- Damage to trees, resulting in premature failure
- Erosion, sediment, and stormwater issues

Decatur Parks & Recreation Project Updates

The Decatur Parks and Recreation Department (DPRD) is working to update facilities to enhance parks and facilities for the community. Here's a roundup of what's in the works:

McKoy Dugout Renovation Project

McKoy dugout renovations are scheduled to begin this fall. Expect enhanced facilities, including new storage rooms, locker rooms, steps, railings, roofing, and a state-of-theart drainage system in both dugouts. Chain link fencing will be replaced with netting, and a fresh coat of paint will complete the upgrade. These improvements will serve both DPRD adult softball and Decatur High School baseball players at McKoy Park.

McKoy Skate Park Renovation Project

Starting the week of October 16, the McKoy Skate Park will undergo a redesign. In close partnership with the Decatur High School Skate Club, this project was guided by the input of avid skaters advocating for improvements. Concrete structures will replace outdated elements, and American Ramp Company will lead the construction. The redesign also involves removing the fence to enhance the open feel of the space. The playground will be closed starting October 16 until construction is completed in early December. This redesign showcases the power of collaboration between Decatur High School Skate Club, residents, and the broader skate community.

Ebster Field and Lights Project

Ebster Field is set to be turfed, opening the door for an array of activities, and brandnew LED lights will illuminate the area. The project is in advanced stages, with several qualified bidders looking to begin construction. The City will soon announce the contractor for these improvements.

Ebster Teen Outdoor Recreation Area

Ebster Park is set for a major reconstruction thanks to a \$2.08 million grant for Enhancing Neighborhood Outcomes in Disproportionally Impacted Communities. Ebster Park will soon evolve into an inclusive community space, with improved access, lighting, and shade areas. Collaborating closely with the community, DPRD is soliciting input to craft a master plan tailored to resident needs, especially our teen population. Anticipate enhancements such as an accessibility ramp, restroom facility, basketball court renovations, playground improvements, and even the possibility of a skate park or a versatile "all wheels" feature.


Track and Field at Legacy Park

CPR Life Save

Scott Carter and Ryan Frazier are two people who can tell you from personal experience that learning CPR can be a life-saving experience. When Scott went into cardiac arrest on the job, Ryan, his co-worker, knew exactly what to do. Without hesitating, he initiated CPR immediately. He knew that every minute without CPR would decrease Scott's chances of survival by 10 percent, so he continued compressions and breaths until Decatur Fire arrived on scene.

A few months prior to the incident, Scott suggested that the crew learn CPR. He was aware that cardiac arrest can occur on the job and CPR could be needed at any time. Ryan had all the training necessary to keep circulating the blood in Scott until help could arrive.

Digging through the (Decatur Focus) Crates

In 1987, the Decatur City Commission adopted the daylily as the city's official flower. Here's the Focus article from July 1990 describing the flower.

THE DAYLILY CITY OF DECATUR'S OFFICIAL FLOWER

hree years ago the Decatur City Commission adopted the daylily as the city's official flower. Since that time, Decatur residents and business owners have planted varieties all over the city. Results of their efforts can be seen now and on into the summer as the daylily begins blooming in May.

Although the daylily is a member of the lily family as are such other plants as onions and hyacinths, it is not a lily. Its botanical name is Hemerocallis, derived from two Greek words meaning "beauty" and "day" or beautify for a day. The phrase is somewhat misleading. While individual blooms are generally open for only a day, there are successive flowers for a number of days during the blooming season. Thus, the daylily is a valuable perennial for its long periods of bloom.

The use of the daylily by the ancient Chinese people began before the development

of written language. Earliest records report the plant's use for food. The flower buds were palatable, digestible, and nutritious. The root and crown were found to be a good pain reliever.

The modern daylily is a highly evolved flowering plant. It originally came from Asia and is known for its toughness, tenacity and ability to grow anywhere- even in ditches. Orange and yellow are the most common colors, but others exist. Common names for the daylily include ditch lily, tiger lily or southern lemon lily.

Hemerocallis expert and long-time Decatur resident, Clyde Davidson, registered 92 diploids and tetraploids with Decatur as the prefix. Thus Decatur's official flower is also official in horticulture circles.

It is often said that the daylily is the "lazy person's flower" because it thrives on neglect and flourishes anywhere. Gardening experts say they are one of the most versatile and adaptable perennials that do require some degree of care.

Daylilies lend themselves to commercial, residential, institutional, conservation, park and parkway uses.



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


City Schools of Decatur Welcomes Gyimah Whitaker
