Madison Avenue Soapbox Derby Takes Victory Lap

Tenth and final race set for Oct. 16

he Madison Avenue Soapbox
Derby challenges amateur
racers to design and build
human-powered soapbox
cars that compete against the clock in a
downhill race. Competitors are divided
into age groups with awards for fastest
times and most creative car themes.


Some 100 competitors took part in 2019, the last year the race was held before the pandemic, with 1,000 spectators lining Madison Avenue to cheer them on and dozens of volunteers working behind the scenes.

Through local business sponsorships, participation by racers and community giving, the event has raised more than \$200K in its first nine years for area nonprofits serving children. According to the organizers at the Madison Avenue Community Fund (MACF), the time is right for the derby to evolve into something new. The group will look to refresh its strategies around fundraising and community event programming moving forward.

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Anti-Racism Speaker Series to Focus on Trust, Vulnerability, and Community Building

ast year, the Better Together Advisory Board and the City of Decatur hosted an Anti-Racism Speaker se-Jries designed to generate awareness of equity concerns in the city and to hold the city and community accountable to achieve our aspiration of being an inclusive, equitable and just city. The past year has served as a poignant reminder of the importance and fragility of our communities. The need to build trust in one another, as the foundation

of strengthening our communities, has never been more important. And yet the barriers to building that trust have perhaps never been more apparent.



This fall's virtual series will engage community leaders, city officials, and activists as we explore the trust deficit in our communities, how it impacts race relations, and how we can deepen collaborative relationships and trust throughout the city of Decatur. This cannot be done without studying and resolving the influence of racism on governmental policies and community norms. The Better Together Advisory Board hopes to challenge and inspire our community to take actionable steps to instill anti-racism throughout our policies and practices.

Moderated by Better Together Co-Chair Ed Lee, the four-part series will culminate in an exploration of community-informed policy changes.

Kick-off Event: "How the Trust Deficit in the U.S. Impacts Race Relations"

In partnership with Little Shop of Stories, the Better Together Advisory Board is excited to kick off the series with a virtual conversation with two local authors Kimberly Jones and Gilly Segal, authors of I'm Not conversations about prejudice and the racial tension that exists in our country. An NAACP Image Award nominee, I'm Not Dying with You Tonight follows two teen girls – one black, one white - who have to confront their own assumptions about racial inequality as they rely on each other to get through the violent race riot that has set their city on fire with civil unrest.

Kimberly Jones, Gilly Segal, and series moderator Ed Lee will explore how we establish trusting interpersonal relationships across our racial and cultural differences. Gilly Segal spent her college years in Israel and served in the IDF. She is currently a lawyer for an advertising agency. Kim Jones is a former manager of Little Shop of Stories who currently works in the entertainment industry. Both live in Atlanta, Georgia.

Watch for more details as the Anti-Racism Series continues. Other events will include:

- An exploration of effective strategies government officials can use to deepen trust throughout our communities;
- A conversation with citizen leaders in Decatur about their strategies to build trust across our differences; and
- An opportunity to learn from other cities.



DECATUR CITY **COMMISSION**

Five City Commissioners are elected in nonpartisan elections for overlapping four-year terms two from District 1, two from District 2, and one At-Large (citywide). George Dusenbury and Lesa Mayer were elected to the commission in November 2019 and Kelly Walsh was elected in 2017.

Each January, Commissioners elect two of their fellow members to serve as mayor and mayor pro tem. Since January 2016, they have elected Commissioner Patti Garrett to serve as mayor. Commissioner Tony Powers was elected in 2015 and has been elected mayor pro tem yearly since 2018.

The regular City Commission meetings in September will be held Tuesday, Sept. 7, and Monday, Sept. 27 in person (temperature checks and face coverings are required), and via Zoom due to the COVID-19 pandemic. INDIGO GIRLS HEADLINE AMPLIFY DECATUR






AJC Decatur Book Festival Moves to October


fter 15 years of hosting literary events in downtown Decatur over Labor Day weekend, the AJC Decatur Book Festival is making a permanent move to the first weekend in October. This year's festival, themed Diverse Voices Building Community, and presented by Emory University, will be a one-day program taking place on Saturday, Oct. 2, at the First Baptist Church of Decatur, as part of a larger festival weekend lineup.

Booksellers will set up pop-up shops at the church along with food pop-ups from the Decatur Farmer's Market. The festival will feature several author events and panels in this compressed format:

- The Second: Race and Guns in a Fatally Unequal America, by Emory professor Carol Anderson (Bloomsbury, June 1). From the New York Times bestselling author of White Rage, the book takes a critical new look at the Second Amendment and how it has been engineered to deny the rights of African Americans. (nonfiction)
- Late City, by Pulitzer Prize winner Robert Olen Butler (Atlantic Monthly Press). A 115-year-old man lies on his deathbed as the 2016 election results arrive. He revisits his life in this moving story of love, fatherhood, and the American century. (fiction)
- A Night at the Sweet Gum Head: Drag, Drugs, Disco, and Atlanta's Gay Revolu-









tion, by Martin Padgett (W.W. Norton and Company). An intimate story of 1970s gay Atlanta through its bedazzling drag clubs and burgeoning rights activism. (memoir)

- Why We Fly, by Gilly Segal and Kim Jones (Sourcebooks). From the New York Times bestselling authors of I'm Not Dying with You Tonight comes a heartfelt story about two teen girls - one black, one white whose friendship is tested by an act of rebellion against systemic racism. (young adult fiction)
- A Picture Book Panel will showcase The Children's Moon, by author/illustrator team Carmen Agra Deedy and Jim La-Marche, and illustrator Laura Freeman (Scholastic Press).
- Acclaimed Coretta Scott King illustrator Honoree Laura Freeman showcases a loving intergenerational family, and encour-

- ages girls to find female heroes in their own lives in the book Standing on Her Shoulders: A Celebration of Women, written by Monica Clark-Robinson. (picture book)
- A Literary Fiction Panel will feature Monster in the Middle, by Emory professor Tiphanie Yanique, an electric new novel that maps the emotional inheritance of one couple newly in love, and The Parted Earth, by Anjali Enjeti (Hub City), a heartfelt and human portrait of the long shadow of the Partition of India on the lives of three generations of women. (fiction)

To celebrate its 20th year, DEF is offering




