Watersense Word Search

How can we manage excess stormwater and prevent flooding when it rains too much? What are some ways to manage water during a drought? Check out these tips and **find each of the words highlighted in blue.**



Curbs and gutters: Keep these clear to divert stormwater into storm drains and prevent storm sewer system clogs.

Downspouts: Point them away from building foundations to **prevent erosion.**

Drought: When it doesn't rain enough, we have to **conserve** water.

Eastern Continental Divide: separates waters that flow to the Atlantic or to the Gulf of Mexico. In Decatur it runs along the railroad track, West Howard and West College Avenues.

Garden mulch: Spread fallen leaves, pine straw or wood chips to prevent erosion and keep soil from drying out.

Green Infrastructure: A water management approach that protects, restores, or mimics the natural water **cycle.**

Permeable surface: Helps stormwater soak into soil.*

Rain garden: Plan and plant to absorb stormwater runoff.*

Storm drain: Collects stormwater and directs it to storm sewers and creeks.

Stormwater runoff: Heavy rain that can cause **flooding** of our yards, streets, and parks when it falls on paved and solid surfaces that don't allow water to soak into the ground.

Stormwater management: Designing the city infrastructure to collect and direct stormwater runoff to prevent flooding and improve **water quality.**

Rain barrel: Collects water for outdoor uses such as watering plants.

Watering: Water garden plants in the morning when it's cooler outside.

Xeriscaping: Planting **native species** that require less water.

*a type of green infrastructure

Plant a tree: Roots prevent soil erosion, shade lowers temperatures and conserves water. Find out how you can plant a Decatur Bicentennial tree, and/or a front yard tree sponsored by Trees Atlanta.

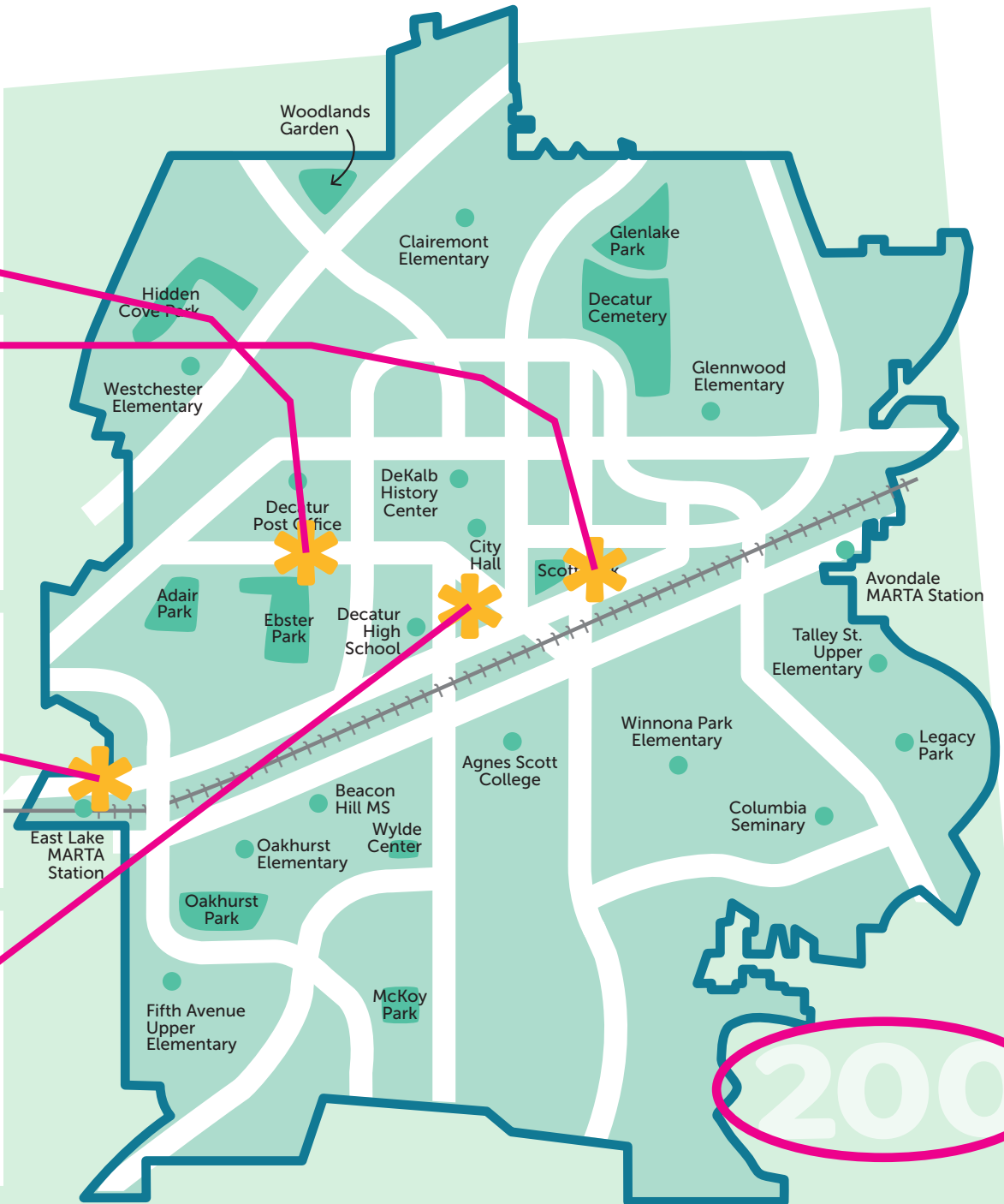
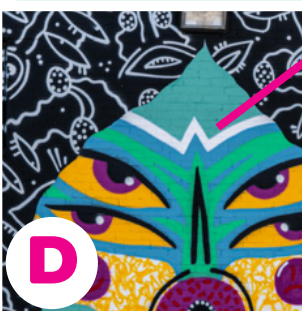
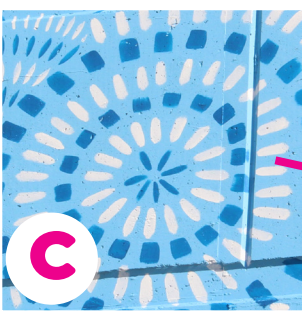
There's a vault under Ebster Field that can hold seven million gallons of water, the same as 10.5 Olympic-size swimming pools.

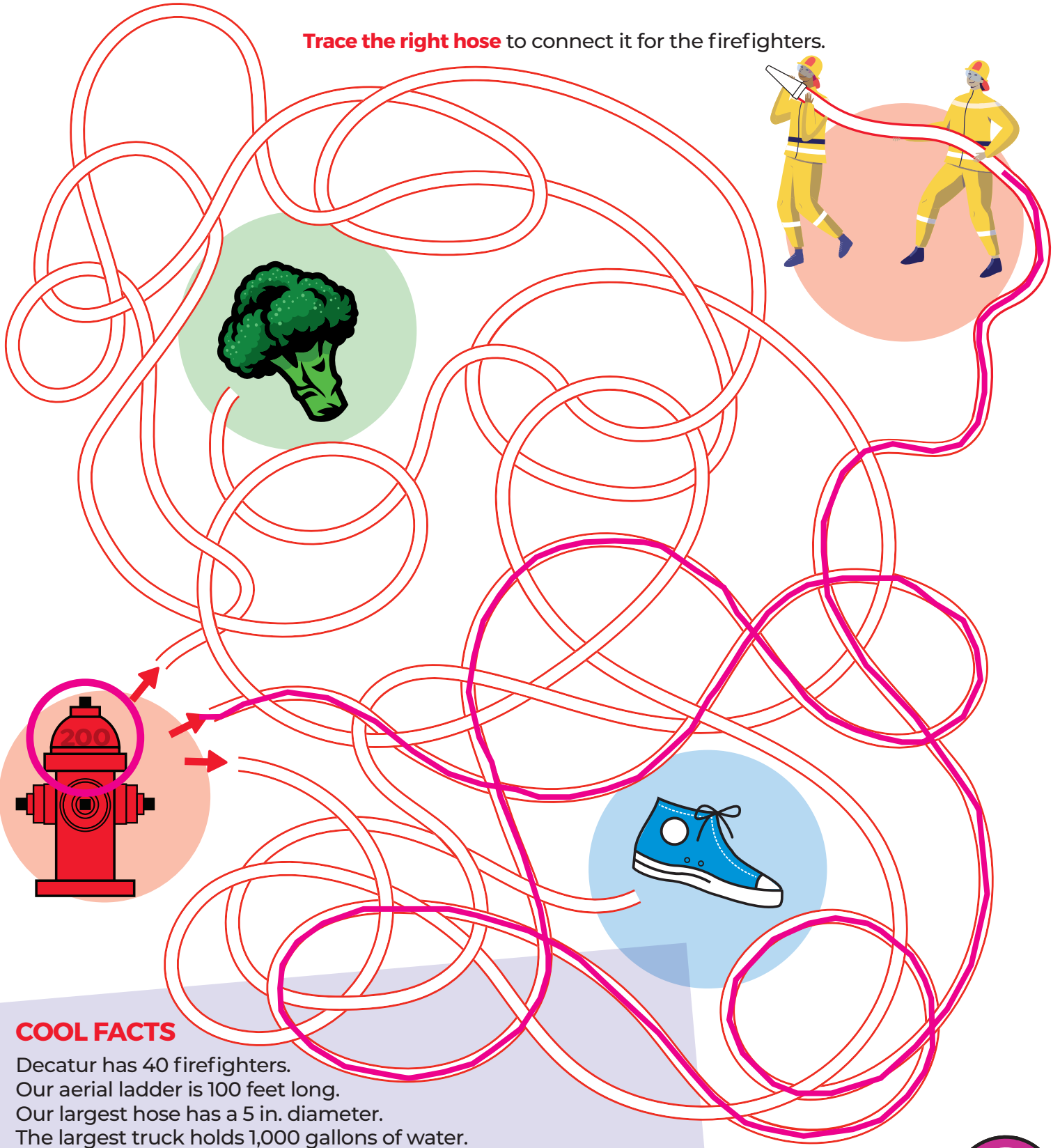

- Decatur has 40 firefighters.
- Our aerial ladder is 100 feet long.
- Our largest hose has a 5 in. diameter.
- The largest truck holds 1,000 gallons of water.
- Firefighters exercise for at least one hour every shift.
- Firefighter gear, including the air pack, weighs about 75 pounds.
- Fire hydrant colors tell how many gallons per minute each provides.

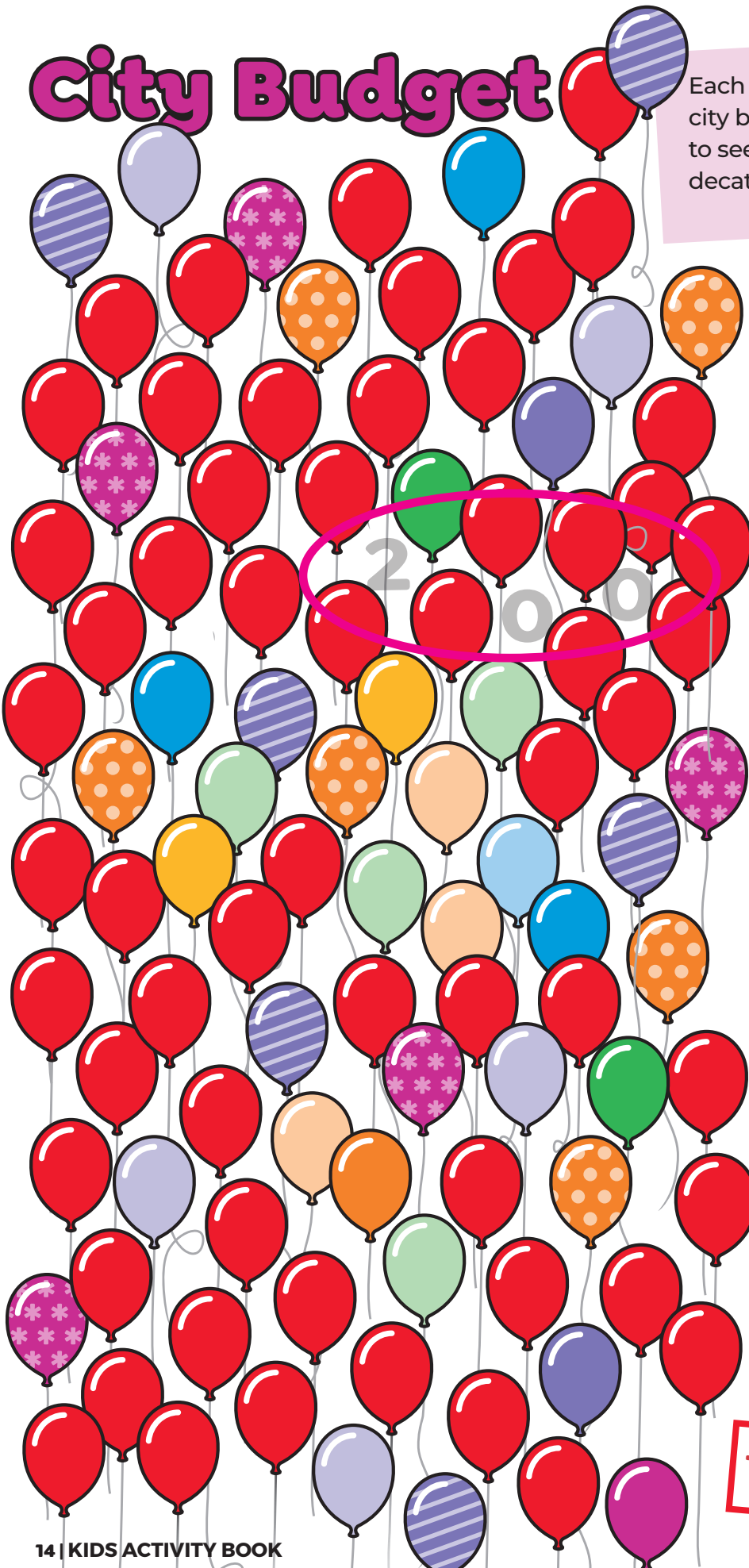
