


Decatur unveiled the \$7.2 million Recreation Center Renovation early in 2013. The project was designed to qualify for the U.S. Green Building Council's LEED Silver designation, and is home to Decatur's Active Living and Children and Youth Services divisions. Among the "new" facility's features:

- Modern gymnasium bleacher seating for 200
- A divider to separate the gym into two basketball or volleyball courts
- An elevated track (16 laps to the mile) around the gym
- Skylights to reduce lighting costs
- Modernized meeting and activity rooms
- A new multi-purpose studio with a "sprung" floor and an innovative mirror wall
- New kitchen for cooking classes and catering
- Upper-level office space for Active Living and Children and Youth Services
- Paneling and ceilings utilizing repurposed wood from the old bleachers and gym floor
- Universal access
- Wi-Fi throughout
- Plenty of bicycle parking





Decatur Offers Free Wi-Fi Hotspots



Decatur now offers free public Wi-Fi throughout downtown Decatur and the Oakhurst business district, and in Oakhurst, Glenlake, McKoy and Adair parks. These spaces are ideally suited for work and play, and now users can count on a reliable Wi-Fi signal free of charge.

This new resource means residents and visitors can stay connected with their smartphones, tablets and other Wi-Fi-enabled devices while in these community spaces.

smart 911

ecatur began offering Smart911 last winter, providing detailed information to first responders, including: how many people live in a structure, medical and health issues, number of pets in the home, and so on. Residents can opt to provide the city's emergency management officials and responders with additional details that may be used in disaster planning, evacuation and recovery efforts.

To participate, visit www.smart911.com and create a Safety Profile, or update your existing profile. It is immediately made available to 9-1-1 when a resident places an emergency call. Within the profile, residents can also grant permission for emergency management officials to see specific rescue-related details for use in a disaster situation.



tinations where automobile ownership is avoidable, and where "walking is not only a health benefit, but a way to connect with neighbors."




Only in Decatur

At press time, more than 90 names were on the waiting list for **Decatur 101**, the annual workshop that explains (and demonstrates) how City of Decatur government functions. Residents participate two to three hours one day a week for seven weeks, for the inside scoop on how the city manages its resources

and interacts with the public. The program accommodates 90 participants each year, 40 in a morning class, and 50 in an evening class. To date, more than 800 citizens have completed the

course. In 2012, to meet popular demand,



the City developed a **Decatur 101 Encore** class for those who've graduated Decatur 101, but want to learn more. The inaugual class featured emergency management, police and fire, emerging trends,

and City Schools of Decatur.

level of recognition this year.




Excellent!

The Atlanta Regional Commission awarded its 2012 Development of Excellence **Great Place Award** to Decatur, citing the city's long-term commitment to a vision of making its downtown an inclusive, vibrant place to live, work and play. The jury commented on the

downtown area's mix of incomes and housing options (public/affordable, market-rate, senior); offerings of services, shopping, recreation and entertainment; transit accessibility; commitment to compact, in-town school siting (DHS campus); commitment to community engagement; high-quality programming (Decatur Book Festival, Craft Beer Festival, etc.); and its adaptability in terms of historic resources.







Local

Decatur launched its "Keep it Indie-catur" promotion last summer. Its purpose: to remind the community to strengthen our local economy by shopping and dining within the city limits.

The community submitted more than 250 slogan ideas and suggestions. A committee of shop and restaurant owners selected their top four entries, which were posted online and on local blogs for public feedback.



ecatur operates under the commission-manager form of government. The City Commission determines the policies of the local government and enacts local laws necessary for the protection of public health, safety and welfare.

Five city commissioners are elected in nonpartisan elections for overlapping four-year terms. At its organizational meeting in January each year the commission elects one of its members to serve as mayor and commission chair.

Jim Baskett was elected Mayor in 2013. He was elected to the City Commission in 1995 and served as Mayor Pro Tem for ten years from 2002-2012. Kecia Cunningham was elected to the City Commission in 1999 and was elected Mayor Pro Tem in 2013. The other commission-

ers are Fred Boykin, Patti Garrett and Scott Drake.

The City Commission appoints the Municipal Court judges and a city attorney, who provides legal counsel for the government. Decatur Municipal Court consists of four judges who are attorneys and residents of Decatur. The current judges are Berryl A. Anderson, Robert N. Leitch, Lindsay R.M. Jones and Rhathelia Stoud; and

two substitute judges, Tom Stubbs and Tisha Tallman in the absence of the regular judges. The city attorney is Decatur resident Bryan Downs.

City Manager

The City Commission appoints the City Manager, a professional administrator who serves as the city's chief executive officer and chief administrative officer. The City Manager is responsible for carrying out the commission's policies and ordinances and for overseeing day-to-day operations of the government and the appointment of all employees, with the appointment of department heads subject to confirmation by the City



The current City Manager, Peggy Merriss, has served as City Manager since May 1993 and has been employed with the city since 1983.

About Decatur

ecatur was incorporated Dec. 10, 1823, and named after Stephen Decatur, a U.S. Naval hero. Commodore Decatur was killed in 1820 and Congress decreed that his name be honored throughout the nation. As a result, more than 40 U.S. cities and counties bear the name Decatur in his memory.

Decatur is the second oldest municipality in the Atlanta metropolitan area and the seat of DeKalb County. It adjoins Atlanta's city limits six miles east of Atlanta's central business district.

The Old Courthouse on Decatur's downtown square sits on a rise of land where two Indian trails once crossed and is the fourth courthouse building to occupy the site. Historically, the square has served as a gathering place and is still the focus of festivals and other community events today.

Decatur has evolved into a vibrant small urban city that values its history and enjoys the sophistication and excitement of a college town along with all the benefits of being in a major metropolitan area. Its tree-lined streets, strong sense of community, high quality of services and nationally recognized public school system continue to draw residents. Its balance of urban amenities and small-town character make Decatur an attractive option for creative business owners, entrepreneurs and individuals seeking to live and work in the same community.
